VIRTUAL PUBLIC HEARING:

Bylaw No. 1398-21: Cancellation of a portion of "FIRST AVE" and "MAIN ST" in Edwand **1.0 Opening**

The Virtual Public Hearing was **called to order at 9:17 a.m.** by the Reeve, Craig Lukinuk in the presence of all Council members, Chief Administrative Officer, Assistant Chief Administrative Officer, and Finance Manager as well as in the virtual presence of the Planning and Development Manager, Planning and Development Assistant, Recording Secretary, GIS Officer, and Communications Technician, **no members of the public, and one member of the media.**

Confirmation was provided by the Chief Administrative Officer, that the Public Hearing had been advertised and notice was provided in accordance with the applicable legislation.

The purpose of the hearing was summarized as:

To obtain public input in favour or opposed in regard to Bylaw No. 1398-21: A Bylaw of the Municipality of Smoky Lake County in the Province of Alberta for the purpose of closing to public travel, portions of a public highway in accordance with section 22 of the Municipal Government Act, Chapter M-26, revised statutes of Alberta 2000, as amended.

2.0 Staff Presentation

Jordan Ruegg, Planning and Development Manager provided the following information:

BACKGROUND:

 On November 11, 2017, Smoky Lake County received a request that the Applicants were interested in applying to have portions of two undeveloped road allowances located within the Hamlet of Edwand closed and consolidated with the adjacent properties.

- A similar request was made in 2010 and surveying work had begun but the County was unable to get commitments from all of the affected landowners to purchase the land comprising the areas of the proposed road closure.
- A number of improvements are currently encroaching onto the road labelled as "FIRST AVE", the road labelled as "MAIN ST." and onto the adjacent lands legally described as Plan 2206CL, Block (R).
- At the August 30, 2018 Smoky Lake County Council Meeting, the following motion was passed:
- Motion 862-18: "That Smoky Lake County prepare a bylaw to close all of the undeveloped road labelled as "FIRST AVE", as shown on Plan 2206CL, and to close all of the undeveloped road labelled as "MAIN ST." as shown on Plan 2206CL, and to consolidate these closed portions with the adjacent lots, at no cost to Smoky Lake County."
- At the October 25, 2018 Smoky Lake County Council Meeting, the following motion was passed:

- There were 4 incidents reported for the period of May 13th, 2021 to June 10, 2021: Near miss of property damage and personal injury; the Odorant Truck avoided a collision while travelling through a school zone on a delivery down south, when a large truck sped passed on the right side; the license plate was reported to RCMP. Near miss of property damage and personal injury; Fire crews attending a structure fire backed the firetruck over a downed powerline unknowingly due to the scene not being properly assessed at first; luckily any incident was avoided and upon arrival of the Deputy Fire Chief brought attention to the line which was then treated as a live wire. as the Safety Officer was not in attendance to provide a verbal report. Personal Injury (no-time-loss); an employee operating the trencher walked along its platform to the landing and slipped, despite a 3-point dismount, hitting their left knee to the grate, due to there being no grip on the landing platform, the incident was witnessed by two other workers; the trencher is being brought into the shop to determine what type of anti-slip material can be applied. Property Damage; May 16, 2021, Vilna Fire Department's 3-ton Rapid Attack unit filled with 300 gallons of water left the road while on a call-out due to the driver trying to avoid a boil in the road and was subsequently unable to drive out of the ditch; the unit had to be towed out of the ditch.
- Internal Audit Action Plan had some progress since last reporting period reported by the Safety
 Officer: Sections 2.11, regarding a process now in place for conducting site-specific hazard
 assessments when a new activity has been temporarily introduced at the work site. Section 2.12,
 regarding site-specific hazard assessments now in place before work begins on the day of the job.
 Verbally noting Section 2.3, regarding health and safety hazards identified for the tasks associated
 with each job is currently in progress.
- Everyone in the County Administration and Shop areas are still healthy and no one is off because of COVID. The County Offices are currently closed to the public and by appointment only. However, all employees must follow the Return-to-Work Guidelines. A memorandum from the Chief Administrative Officer will be sent to all County Staff in preparation for the future public reopening of Smoky Lake County's Offices in respect to the prospect of employees returning to pre-pandemic work environments; and include a survey for employee to complete for the purpose of gauging the effectiveness of the County's current internal communications about the pandemic restrictions and to help identify challenges faced by employees to evaluate how they will be addressed; and extend an invitation to those employees who can participate to participate in a working group to create a "reopening" strategy tailored to Smoky Lake County when Alberta reopens as COVID-19 vaccinations go up and hospitalizations go down.

- Staff is often working alone, always using working alone policy and checking in with one another throughout the day.
- Firefighters from all 3 departments are receiving the 2 Covid-19 shot last week and this week.
 - Spring farm work is wrapping up with farmers rushing to finish... Large farm equipment is on the roads so drive with caution, paying extra attention to the equipment/vehicle blind spots etc., give farm equipment/vehicles the right of away and plan your drive.
- Increased wildlife is on or near the roadways, with all the new offspring taking place so drive with caution.
- Safety Officer is looking into starting up toolbox meetings.
- Theft in the region continues so please ensure all vehicles/equipment whether County owned or
 personal are secured etc. and report all suspicious activities to the RCMP immediately.
- Keep your mind on task at all times, conduct hazard assessments, and report all incidents to help prevent loss.
- Please continue to report all hazardous road conditions including fallen or leaning trees, missing road signs etc. to County Public Works.

Thank you for agreeing to host First Nations voters for the Senate and referenda voting initiative being held on October 18, 2021. In response to suggestions raised by our stakeholders, I have approved adjustments to the *Local Authorities Election Act (LAEA)* to increase access and streamline requirements for First Nations voters.

The attached Ministerial Order (MO) No. MSD:065/21 enables the use of band and federal status cards as acceptable forms of identification for the purposes of the initiative, amends the notice requirements so that notice is deemed to have been given under Section 35 of the *LAEA* if it has been mailed, delivered, or sent by electronic means to the First Nation Band Council office within the legislated timelines, and that the Band Council be requested to communicate the notice to their community members.

I also want to confirm that only one ballot box is required for all Senate ballots and one separate box for all referendum ballots collected, regardless of the community in which the voters reside. Elections Alberta simply requires notification of which jurisdictions your community is including with your own ballots, which my staff will provide to them upon finalizing the agreement between your municipality and my department.

I am pleased we are able to work together and trust this MO provides you with the needed flexibility to ensure the Senate and referendum initiative is a success for all Albertans.

- 1. That as required by Section 8 of the *Referendum Act*, and Section 38 of the *Alberta Senate Election Act* and for the purposes of conducting elections under those Acts in conjunction with the general municipal election on October 18, 2021, electors residing in Indian reserves that are not listed in Appendix A of Ministerial Order No. MSD:066/21:
 - a) Notice of the Senate Election and a vote on any referendum questions is deemed to have been given under Section 35 of the LAEA, if that notice has been mailed, delivered, or sent by electronic means to the First Nation Band Council office within the legislated timelines;
 - b) That the First Nation Band Council be requested to make the notice available to members of the First Nation Band in the manner deemed appropriate by the Band Council;
 - c) Section 53(3)(b) of the LAEA is altered to include federal "Indian status" or local "band card" and the information on such cards is deemed to satisfy the person's identity and place of residence for the purpose of determining elector eligibility to vote in the Senate Election and on any referendum questions in accordance with the LAEA; and
 - d) Section 77.1(1)(b) of the LAEA is altered to include being resident outside of the local jurisdiction.

Gene,

The first step to closing the road will be for you to make an application to have the road closed (an email stating your intentions will suffice as for some reason we don't have an application form) and paying the \$500.00 application fee. Once I have received your 'application' and fee, I will begin preparing a bylaw for Council's consideration. This will require me to obtain an appropriate legal description of the closure area, to be provided by an Alberta Land Surveyor. After First Reading is given, the closure area will need to be surveyed prior to the bylaw being the subject of a Public Hearing. During this period, I will also refer the proposed closure to the appropriate utility companies and other referees to make sure that they don't have any objections. Following the Public Hearing, and should Council choose to proceed with the bylaw, a copy of said bylaw and any representations made at the Public Hearing, along with the responses received from the referral agencies, will be forwarded to the Minister of Transportation for his signature. Should the Minister provide his blessing, the bylaw will be returned to Council for Second/Third Readings. Following this, documents will be sent to Land Titles and a Certificate of Title for the former road will be created, and then further consolidated with your property.

I should note that in addition to the \$500 application fee, the costs of advertising the bylaw and for the surveying are also borne by the applicant. So overall I'd say you're going to be looking at between \$2,500-3,000 in total costs.

Please see the attached Policy that outlines the process in further detail.

Purpose:To provide a process to close a Government Road Allowance, or cancel a
surveyed Road Plan.

Policy Statement and Guidelines:

1. **DEFINITIONS**

- 1.1 **Government Road Allowance** 66 feet wide
 - 1.1.1 in a north-south direction, with one mile between each column of sections east to west, commencing on the eastern range boundary. Also known as Range Roads.
 - 1.1.2 in an east-west direction, two miles between each 2nd row of sections south to north, commencing on the southern township boundary. Also known as Township Roads.
- 1.2 **Road Plan** Surveyed areas acquired for public purposes such as new roads, road widening, diversion and drainage ditches which are undertaken by the municipality under the authority of the *Municipal Government Act*.

When a municipality or the Crown acquires land for a road or other public work by an agreement with the owner, title to the land is vested in the city, or in the case of any other municipality, the Crown in right of Alberta by filing a plan of survey at the Land Titles Office.

1.3 **Road** – means land

- 1.3.1 shown as a road on a plan of survey that has been filed or registered in a Land Titles Office, or
- 1.3.2 used as a public road,
- 1.3.3 as or within a Government road allowance,

and includes a bridge forming part of a public road and any other structure incidental to a public road.

2. TEMPORARY ROAD CLOSURE

2.1 Council, may by resolution or a Designated Officer if authorized by Council resolution, temporarily close the whole or a part of a road at any time that a construction or maintenance project on or adjacent to the road may create a hazard.

3. **PERMANENT ROAD CLOSURE / CANCELLATION BY RESOLUTION –** *Municipal Government Act, Section 24*

Council, may by resolution, with the approval of the Minister of Transportation, close the whole or any part of a Road described in a surveyed Road Plan that the Council determines is no longer required for use by the travelling public owing to the existence of an alternative route.

PROCEDURE

- 3.1 A Landowner may request the County to consider cancellation of the whole or any part of an undeveloped Road Plan or the County may initiate the action.
- 3.2 A Request for Decision (*as per* Policy Statement No. 01-27: Request For Decision) shall be presented to Council for consideration for Road Closure by Resolution, see attached *Schedule "A"*: <u>Sample Resolution</u>.
- 3.3 The road is usually returned to the title from which it was excepted (i.e. the ¹/₄ section). Consolidation with the adjacent land parcels may require a Descriptive Plan or a Plan of Survey. When using a Descriptive Plan, Land Titles should be consulted to ensure that the description is suitable for registration.
- 3.4 No advertising is necessary, but an agreement or consent must be obtained from the landowner(s) affected. If there is more than one adjacent owner, direction from the municipality as to the disposition of the Road shall be provided to affected landowners, and consent from all affected landowners is required, see attached *Schedule "B"*: <u>Sample Resolution Letter & Consent</u>.
- 3.5 The municipality is responsible for ensuring that all third party interests and the interests of anyone who might be adversely affected are protected.

Council, may by Bylaw, with the approval of the Minister of Transportation, close the whole or any part of a Government Road Allowance (or a surveyed Road Plan, when preferred).

- 4.1 Prior to First Reading of the Bylaw, the applicant shall provide a detailed sketch of the proposed closure area, which includes an approximate calculation of the area of land included in the proposed closure area. Following First Reading, and prior to a Public Hearing being held on the proposed Bylaw, the applicant shall provide a Plan of Survey or a Descriptive Plan, prepared by an Alberta Land Surveyor, showing the fully-calculated closure area. Costs of the Plan of Survey or a Descriptive Plan shall be borne solely by the applicant.
- 4.2 A Request for Decision (as per Policy Statement No. 01-27: Request For Decision) shall be presented to Council for consideration for Road Closure by Bylaw, see attached Schedule "D": Sample Bylaw. Council must give First Reading to the Bylaw prior to a Public Hearing and prior to submitting it to Alberta Transportation for approval.





PROPOSAL		• To accept for information, the Remediation Report, dated July 15, 2021, and the Groundwater Monitoring Report, dated July 15, 2021, both prepared by Action Land & Environmental Services Ltd., & to instruct the Development Authority to proceed with making application to the Minister of Environment and Parks to vary the 300 meter setback distance from a non operating landfill.
BACKGROU	ND	 In June, 2015, Smoky Lake County became aware of a "nuisance ground" notation on the Certificate of Title of the lands legally described as Plan 5225CL: OT, located to the north of the Village of Waskatenau. The "nuisance ground" notation on the Certificate of Title places restrictions on development, specifically prohibiting the development of a residence, school, hospital or food serving establishment within 300 meters of a non-operating landfill. The "nuisance ground" notation refers to the existence of a previous landfill on said lands. The prohibition of these uses prevents the Development Authority for Smoky Lake County and the Development Authority for the Village of Waskatenau from issuing Development Permits for these uses, stifling the potential for economic development in both municipalities.
		 According to the Subdivision and Development Regulations, the Subdivision or Development Authority may be granted the authority to vary the 300 meter setback distance upon receiving written consent from Alberta Environment and Parks. Consent to reduce the setback distance is determined on a case-by-case basis. In order to make a determination, Alberta Environment and Parks requires detailed information to be provided by the County, including an engineering report detailing the nature of the potential contaminants observed on said lands. After conversations with representatives from Alberta Environment and Parks, it had been determined that reclamation of said lands is required before Smoky Lake County could apply
		 for a reduction to the 300m development setback. Subsequently, Smoky Lake County conducted both a Phase I and Phase II Environmental Site Assessment to determine the nature and extent of contaminants on the site. The results of these Assessments informed the Remedial Action Plan was prepared by Action Land & Environmental Services Ltd. in February, 2019, to give the County an idea of what work would be required to reclaim the site, as well as an estimate for the cost of completing said work.
		 The Phase II Assessment identified "areas of concern" located near the southeast corner of the site, within the former burn pit area, extending northeast from the northern boundary of burn pit. Contaminants of concern identified in the Phase II Assessment included: Metals; Furans; Dioxans; Salinity; and Hydrocarbons

 <u>May 23, 2019 Smoky Lake County Council Meeting</u> <u>Motion 711-19</u>: "That Smoky Lake County proceed to prepare a tender for the reclamation and remediation of the former Waskatenau Nuisance Grounds, located on the lands legally described as 5225CL; OT."
• Preparation of the Tender was delayed as the County was in conversation with representatives from Alberta Transportation regarding potential funding for partial costs associated with the reclamation of the site.
• August 10, 2020 Smoky Lake County Council Meeting Motion 982-20: "That Smoky Lake County proceed to advertise the Request for Proposal for Site Reclamation and Remediation of the Former Waskatenau Nuisance Grounds, legally described as Plan 5225CL; OT (Pt.SE-16-59-19-W4M), on the: Alberta Purchasing Connection (APC), County Social Media, and Smoky Lake Signal and Redwater Review newspapers, with a closure date of August 31, 2020 at 2:00 p.m. MST."
 September 1, 2020 Smoky Lake County Council Meeting Motion 1115-20: "That Smoky Lake County award the tender to CERA Contracting Ltd. of Waskatenau, Alberta, in the bid amount of \$67,698.75 (sixty seven thousand, six hundred, ninety eight dollars and seventy five cents), for the Site Reclamation and Remediation of the Former Waskatenau Nuisance Grounds, legally described as Plan 5225CL; OT (Pt.SE-16- 59-19-W4M); and executed all necessary agreements upon receipt of surety as indicated in the Request for Proposal for the said project."
• Reclamation of the site commenced on October 6, 2020 and was completed in June of 2021. A total of 1,973.10 tonnes of material was removed in October, 2020, and an additional 322.55 tonnes of material was removed in March, 2021, after discussions with Alberta Environment and Parks took place over the results of removal of the initial material.
 July 15, 2021 – Remediation Report & Groundwater Monitoring Report Action Land & Environmental Services Ltd. prepared a Remediation Report and a Groundwater Monitoring Report following the completion of the reclamation work.
 The Remediation Report summarized the results of the reclamation as follows: "Elevated salinity, boron, and zinc parameters remaining at the Site are expected to dissipate over time as the impacted source material has been removed. At this time, these remaining impacts are not anticipated to cause significant environmental damage to the site or surrounding area and are not a concern to human health. This conclusion is based on the following: The heavily impacted source material has been removed therefore the remaining levels
 of salts and metals remaining at the Site are expected to decrease over time. Previously identified hydrocarbons, dioxins and furans noted at the Site during the Phase II ESA have been removed, this removing concerns for human health.
 The Site is zoned as Highway Commercial Land Use and the County has indicated that the future Site will be Commercial or Light Industrial. Therefore impacts to vegetation growth, related soil nutrients and soil and food ingestion by livestock and wildlife are not likely a significant concern with regard to elevated salinity or metals parameters. Soil invertebrates are expected to have minimal contact with the elevated boron and zinc concentrations in the soils as the elevated boron and zinc concentrations are located within a thin vertical and horizontal area at the limits of the excavation (based
 on information from the Phase II ESA and remedial sampling results) with non-impacted soil present both above and below the elevated boron and zinc levels. There are no surface water bodies or water wells within 300 m of the site. Phase II ESA drilling (2018) did not identify any stratigraphy that would be indicative of a domestic use aquifer within 9 m of surface. The 2018 groundwater monitoring report indicates that shallow groundwater, in the

	groundwater monitoring wells, in the area of the excavation, has EC and chloride concentrations within the commercial and industrial guidelines therefore the salinity at
	the Site has not impacted the groundwater beyond applicable guidelines.
	 Boron and zinc have not been identified as contaminates of concern in the groundwater therefore the environmental risk of the remaining boron and zinc at the Site is low.
	 Borehole logs from the Phase II ESA show that soils are consistently silty clay fill from approximately 1.5 m to at least 9 m below ground surface. Texture analysis from the
	Phase II ESA indicates that the soils are fine grained with a particle size analysis of
	 44.0% or less greater than 75 um. Phase II ESA and remediation results indicate that impacts are primarily situated in the
	 shallow surface soils above approximately 1.75 m." A copy of the Remediation Report is attached for reference.

	 The Groundwater Monitoring Report summarized the results of the groundwater monitoring as follows:
	"The groundwater monitoring identified impacts in the shallow groundwater across the Site. Elevated chloride ion concentrations in the north boundary of the Site exceed the applicable
	guidelines for groundwater and due to their proximity to the highway and the major intersection appear to be most likely related to salt impacts related to road salts from the
	adjacent highway intersection. This may also be what is impacting BH 18-05 resulting in elevated chloride concentrations. If the elevated chloride and sodium noted in the
	groundwater at the Site are related to the historic nuisance ground activities, then it is
	expected that these concentrations will begin to decline with time since the source of the impacts has been removed. The elevated sulphate concentrations are elevated across the
	Site and are considered naturally occurring and not a result of the historic landfill activities. Elevated sodium, chloride and sulphate concentrations noted in the groundwater at the Site

1 EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Smoky Lake County retained Action Land and Environmental Services Ltd. to conduct remedial activities at the former Waskatenau Nuisance Ground in Smoky Lake County, Alberta located at the SE of 16-059-19 W4M. These activities were conducted based on the Phase II Environmental Site Assessment completed by Action in 2018. Areas that were impacted by historic waste disposal activities at the Site were excavated and removed for disposal.

Three areas of concern, outlined in the Phase II ESA, were addressed during the remedial activity. These areas were located near the southeast corner of the Site, within the former "burn pit" area and extending northeast from the north end of the "burn pit". Contaminants of concern included metals, furans, dioxins, salinity, and hydrocarbons.

In October 2020 and March 2021 Action supervised the removal of 1973.10 tonnes and 322.55 tonnes, respectively, impacted materials from the site. Soil samples were taken from the limits of the excavation to confirm remedial success.

An adjustment to the guidelines was discussed with the Alberta Department of Environment and Parks. Based on site conditions, metals guidelines were adjusted, where applicable, to exclude the Ecological Protection of Freshwater Aquatic Life pathway as there are no surface water bodies within 300 m of the Site. With this guideline adjustment the applicable referenced guidelines applied are the commercial and industrial guidelines with Ecological Direct Soil Contact and Ecological Off-Site Migration pathways for the applicable metals. Ecological Off-Site Migration pathway is being applied for boron and zinc as the Ecological Direct Soil Contact pathway is not considered applicable to this site with regards to these metals, as described in Section 5.4.

Analytical results from samples from the excavation limits indicated the following:

- Hydrocarbon concentrations, including PAHs, were less than the applicable referenced guidelines and generally not detected.
- Salinity parameters from the final excavation limits were within the applicable guidelines for commercial/industrical landuse with the exception of the following:
 - There were final limit samples which exceeded the commercial/industrical landuse guideline for EC. All of these samples were still within or better than the "poor" soil rating for both topsoil and subsoil.
 - Four limit soil samples exceeded the commercial/industrial landuse guideline for SAR. These four samples were only slightly greater than the guidline with the maximum SAR concentration at 14.15.
 - The excavation limits have elevated sodium and sulphate as compared to apparent background soil conditions.
 - Chloride concentrations exceeding 500 mg/kg remain in five of the final limit samples analyzed for chloride.
- Metals parameters were all less than the referenced guidelines with the exception of boron and zinc.

- Boron exceeded the Ecological Direct Soil Contact pathway for 22 of the 42 samples analyzed. Of these samples, only one of them exceeded the Ecological Off-Site Migration pathway. The area with the sample exceeding the Ecological Off-Site Migration pathway was subsequently removed.
- In one analyzed sample Zinc exceeded the ecological direct soil contact pathway. This sample did not exceed the Ecological Off-Site Migration pathway.
- Dioxin and Furan concentrations were less than the referenced guidelines.

In July 2021 the excavation was backfilled with clean material from a location approximately 2 km south of the Site.

Elevated salinity, boron and zinc parameters remaining at the Site are expected to dissipate over time as the impacted source material has been removed. At this time these remaining impacts are not anticipated to cause significant environmental damage to the site or surrounding area and are not a concern to human health. This conclusion is based on the following:

- The heavily impacted source material has been removed therefore the remaining levels of salts and metals remaining at the Site are expected to decrease over time.
- Previously identified hydrocarbons, dioxins and furans noted at the Site during the Phase II ESA have been removed, thus removing concerns for human health.
- The site is zoned as Highway Commercial Land Use and The County has indicated that the future Site use will be Commercial or Light Industrial. Therefore impacts to vegetation growth, related soil nutrients and soil and food ingestion by livestock and wildlife are not likely a significant concern with regards to the elevated salinity or metals parameters.
- Soil invertebrates are expected to have minimal contact with the elevated boron and zinc concentrations in the soils as the elevated boron and zinc concentrations are located within a thin vertical and horizontal area at the limits of the excavation (based on information from the Phase II ESA and remedial sampling results) with non-impacted soil present both above and below the elevated boron and zinc levels.
- There are no surface water bodies or water wells within 300 m of the Site.
- Phase II ESA drilling (2018) did not identify any statigraphy that would be indicative of a domestic use aquifer within 9 m of surface.
- The 2018 groundwater monitoring report indicates that shallow groundwater, in the groundwater monitoring wells, in the area of the excavation, has EC and chloride concentrations within commercial and industrial guidelines therefore the salinity at the site has not impacted the groundwater beyond applicable guidelines.
- Boron and zinc have not been identified as contaminates of concern in the groundwater therefore the environmental risk of the remaining boron and zinc at the Site is low.
- Borehole logs from the Phase II ESA show that soils are consistanly silty clay till from approximatley 1.5 m to at least 9 m below ground surface. Texture analysis from the Phase II ESA indicates that the soils are fine grained with a partical size analysis of 44.0% or less greater than 75 um.



• Phase II ESA and remediation results indicate that impacts are primarily situated in the shallow surface soils above approximately 1.75 m.

It is recommended that annual groundwater monitoring continue at the site to continue to track any changes to the Site and surrounding shallow groundwater.



2 INTRODUCTION

Smoky Lake County (The County) retained Action Land and Environmental Services Ltd. (Action) to conduct remedial activities at the former Waskatenau Nuisance Ground in Smoky Lake County, Alberta located at the SE of 16-059-19 W4M, hereafter referred to as 'Site'. These activities on site were conducted based on the findings from Action report *Phase 2 Environmental Site Assessment Report for Former Waskatenau Nuisance Ground Smoky Lake County, Alberta SE 16-059-19 W4M,* October 2018. Areas that were impacted by historic activities were excavated and removed from the site for disposal. This report describes remediation activities conducted at the Site in October of 2020 and March of 2021. Photos of the Site are included in Appendix A.

2.1 Standards and Methodology

The remedial work was performed in general accordance with the following documents:

- Alberta Environment and Parks (AEP). 2015. *Soil Remediation Guidelines for Boron: Environmental and Human Health*. Land Policy Branch, Policy and Planning Division;
- Alberta Environment and Parks (AEP). 2016. *Alberta Environmental Site Assessment Standard* (AEP, 2016);
- Alberta Environment and Parks (AEP). 2019. *Alberta Tier 1 Soil and Groundwater Remediation Guidelines*. Land Policy Branch, Policy and Planning Division (AEP, 2019);
- Alberta Environment and Parks (AEP). 2019. *Alberta Tier 2 Soil and Groundwater Remediation Guidelines*. Land Policy Branch, Policy and Planning Division (AEP, 2019);
- Canadian Council of Ministers of the Environment (CCME). 1993. *Guidance Manual on Sampling, Analysis, and Data Management for Contaminated Sites* (CCME, 1993);
- Government of Alberta (GOA). 2010. Standards for Landfills in Alberta; and
- National Research Council of Canada (NRC). 1988. *The Canadian System of Soil Classification (third edition)*. Soil Classification Working Group. NRC Press, M-55. Agriculture and Agri-Food Canada Publication 1646.

2.2 Scope of Work

The scope of work for the remedial activities was prepared based on the environmental concerns identified at the Site during the Phase II ESA and field observations during the remediation. The scope of work comprised of the following tasks:

- Contact underground utility companies to arrange for proximity agreements;
- Contact Alberta 1-Call and prepare for ground disturbance activities;
- Supervise utility locating within the proposed work area;
- Obtain sample from the backfill to determine suitability;
- Supervise excavation and stockpiling of impacted soils;
- Obtain a sample from the stockpile for Class II Landfill Analysis;
- Coordinate landfill approval and waste manifests with the Waste Management Thorhild Landfill located near Newbrook, Alberta;

- Supervise hauling of the impacted material from the Site to the Thorhild Landfill located near Newbrook, Alberta.
- Sample the walls and base of the excavations to confirm removal of all environmentally impacted materials;
- Conduct field screening tests for hydrocarbons and salinity on samples;
- Submit selected soil samples for laboratory analysis of the following parameters:
 - Petroleum hydrocarbons (HCs);
 - Detailed Salinity;
 - o Trace metals;
 - Polycyclic aromatic hydrocarbons (PAHs);
 - o Dioxins; and
 - Furans.
- Confirm suitable soil to be used for backfilling the excavation.
- Backfill excavated area.
- Prepare a report summarizing the findings of the remediation and provide recommendations for further work, as required and/or closure.

3 SITE CHARACTERIZATION

3.1 Site Description

The Site is located within the SE of 16-059-19 W4M, approximately 110 m north of the northern limits of the town of Waskatenau and approximately 19 km west of Smoky Lake, Alberta within Smoky Lake County. The Site is 152.4 m by 102.3 m (3.85 acre, 1.56 hectares).

The Site is a historic former waste disposal site that has been decommissioned, backfilled and reclaimed. The Site is presented on Figure 1, Site Location Plan and Figure 2, Site Figure with Approximate Borehole Locations. Photos of the Site taken during the remedial work are included in Appendix A.

Currently the Site location is zoned as Highway Commercial Land Use and The County has indicated that the future Site use will be Commercial or Light Industrial.

3.2 Surrounding Land Use

The Site is currently a vacant lot with a ground cover of various grasses and weeds. North of the site is a commercial property consisting of a gas station and various businesses. East of the Site is an industrial property utilized by a towing company. West of the Site is a gravel road and cultivated farmland. South of the Site is a tame hay crop. The nearest water bodies are Waskatenau Creek located approximately 350 m northeast and east of the site and a small wetland area located approximately 340 m southeast of the Site.





3.3 Water Well Records

Water well records on file with Abacus Datagraphics (Abadata) were searched within an approximate 1,600 m radius of the Site. One domestic and stock well, 14 domestic water wells, five municipal wells, and eight water wells of unknown or "other" use were reported within the search area. Water well records are included in Appendix B.

Water well depths ranged between 40 ft to 500 ft (12 m to 152 m). The lithology, where reported, generally consisted of clay at the surface, underlain by interbedded shale, sand and/or sandstone to the reported depths.

The nearest water wells appear to be located as follows:

- NW 16-059-19 W4M Four wells, drilled between 1979 and 1998 for domestic use. These wells are expected to be associated with the farmyard located approximately 426 m northwest of the Site.
- NE 16-059-19 W4M Eight wells, drilled between 1965 and 1996 for domestic and unknown use. These wells are expected to be associated with the farmyard located approximately 585 m northeast of the Site.
- SW 16-059-19 W4M Two wells, drilled in 1961 and 1973 for domestic use. These wells are expected to be associated with the farmyard located approximately 794 m southwest of the Site.

Depths of these wells range from 22.8 m to 109.73 m below ground surface. Well records from these well do not indicate water depth or depth to a pump.

3.4 Topography and Drainage

Local topography of the general area of the Site is classified as an undulating, high relief with a limiting slope of 4% (ASIV). Local topography at the Site is generally flat with an approximate elevation of approximately 635 m above sea level (AbaData). Local drainage appears to be controlled by a gentle slope to the south towards the town of Waskatenau.

3.5 Geology and Hydrogeology

The underlying bedrock in the area is comprised of the Upper Cretaceous, Belly River Group. These deposits are fine- to coarse-grained, marginally marine to nonmarine, interbedded sandstone, grey to brown carbonaceous siltstone, and coal seams (Prior, 2013).

The surficial geology in the area is generally Pleistocene, stagnation moraine sediments composed of mainly till with even thickness, local water-sorted material up to 30 m. This area is characterized by undulating topography with local relief generally less than 3 m (Shetson, 1990).

Water in the area of the Site is generally obtained from the Wapiti Formation. Yields range from 4.5 litres/minute (L/min) to 22.7 L/min. Groundwater quality in the area of the Site is generally good with mainly calcium bicarbonate and low sulfate and chloride levels. Chemically sulphate generally constitutes more than 60% of the anions, sodium and potassium generally constitute more than 60% of the cations and total dissolved solids are generally an average of 2000 parts per million (ppm). The groundwater level elevation in the area of the Site is described as averaging 60 m and the flow direction is generally flowing towards the North Saskatchewan River to the south (Borneuf, 1973).

Shallow groundwater beneath the site is interpreted to flow toward the east-northeast, based on 2018 groundwater monitoring.

3.6 Soil Description

The Site is located within the Elk Point Ecodistrict, Boreal Transition Eco Region, within the Dry Mixedwood Natural SubRegion of the Boreal Forest natural Region (ABADATA, 2018), (Downing and Pettapiece, 2006). The soils in the area are classified as Black-Dark Gray Chernozem on Dark Gray Luvisol. Specifically, the soils are classified in the Rolly View and UNCAS series. Both series soils are described as well-drained, moderately fine textured, moderately calcareous and non-saline till (ASIV, 2016), (ABADATA, 2018).

4 PREVIOUS ENVIRONMENTAL REPORTS

Phase I Environmental Site Assessment - Waskatenau Nuisance Grounds, Associated Environmental Alberta Ltd., April 2016

- A former landfill/waste disposal area is present at the site with waste disposal activities estimated to have occurred over 50 years ago;
- There is a high potential for contamination for soil, soil vapour and/or groundwater at the Site;
- A burn pit was discovered at the Site;
- Historic wastes at the site are described as car parts and municipal wastes; and
- There is possible hydrocarbon contamination related to a gas station located north of the Site.

Phase 2 Environmental Site Assessment Report for Former Waskatenau Nuisance Ground Smoky Lake County, Alberta SE 16-059-19 W4M, Action Land & Environmental Services Ltd., October 2018

- F3 hydrocarbons, PAHs, EC, sodium absorption ratio (SAR), metals, dioxins and furans exceeding the applicable referenced guidelines were found in soil samples from the site with the major area of significant impacts being the former burn pit;
- Further remedial work is recommended to address the impacts noted across the Site; and
- Groundwater should be monitored and sampled to help further determine the extent of the impacts and help in the development of a suitable remedial action plan.
- The analytical results indicated that all remaining analyzed parameters in the soil samples obtained from the Site were compliant with the applicable regulatory guidelines (AEP, 2016).

Groundwater Monitoring Report for Former Waskatenau Nuisance Ground Smoky Lake County, Alberta SE 16-059-19 W4M, Action Land & Environmental Services Ltd., January 2019

- Groundwater from seven groundwater monitoring wells at the Site was monitored and sampled.
- At the time of sampling depths to groundwater ranged from 1.54 m bgs near the centre of the Site to 2.17 m bgs in the southeast corner of the Site. Shallow groundwater beneath the site was interpreted to flow toward the east-northeast.

- The laboratory analytic results indicate that EC, manganese and uranium exceeded referenced ABT1G in all the monitoring wells. Of the seven monitoring wells sampled at the Site chloride was elevated in four, sulphate was elevated in five, and arsenic was elevated in two of the samples.
- Typical tracer chemicals/indicator parameters for landfill leachate are chloride, sodium and sulphate (BCE, 2019). The chemical quality of the groundwater from the surficial deposits within some areas of Smoky Lake County contain high levels of sulphate (HCL, 1998) so the elevated sulphate concentrations at the Site are considered naturally occurring and not a result of the historic landfill activities. The elevated EC is likely a result of the naturally occurring elevated sulphates.
- Through most of the region the chloride ion concentration is generally less than 100 mg/L (HCL, 1998). The elevated chloride in the centre and northeast corner of the Site may be the result of leachate from the historic waste disposal/landfill activities at the Site.
- Naturally elevated levels of arsenic, manganese and uranium are common in the area, therefore the levels of arsenic, manganese and uranium in the groundwater at the site, above the referenced guidelines, are likely naturally occurring.
- The laboratory results report hydrocarbon, dioxin and furans and PAH parameters from all wells were below applicable guideline values and generally non-detectable. The remaining laboratory results were all less than the applicable guideline values.

File and Data Review, Action Land & Environmental Services Ltd., August 2020

- Data from the two previously referenced reports was reviewed and compared against the new January 2019 Alberta Tier 1 Soil Remediation Guidelines (ABT1G). During this review landuse was revised to commercial and industrial with respect to the guidelines used based on municipal land zoning and future landuse plans for the Site.
- Further review of the groundwater information indicated that MW18-04 was not likely representative of background groundwater conditions and target chloride concentrations in groundwater has been adjusted to 250 mg/L based on the exclusion of the Ecological Aquatic Life Pathway. Electrical conductivity guidelines have also been disregarded based on current and future land zoning.

5 REMEDIAL ACTIVITY DETAILS

5.1 Methodology

The remediation methodology was based upon the Standards and Methods identified in Section 2.1. The excavation areas are shown on Figure 2 and laboratory reported results are summarized in Tables 1 to 3. Site photographs taken during the remediation are included in Appendix A.

Public locates were completed by Action through Alberta 1-Call. Prior to ground disturbance activities the Site, including a 30.0 m buffer, was located for underground facilities.



Three areas of concern, outlined in the Phase II ESA, were addressed during the remedial activity. These areas are shown on Figure 2:

- Area A: Near the southeast corner of the Site where a number of metals were found exceeding the referenced guidelines.
- Area B: Former "burn pit" as described in previous reports. Elevated furans, dioxins, salinity, metals, and hydrocarbon parameters greater than referenced guidelines were noted within this area.
- Area C: Extending northeast from the north end of the "burn pit" had elevated hydrocarbon, salinity and metals parameters.

Discrete soil samples were collected from the limits of the excavation. Soil samples submitted for laboratory analyses were chosen based upon field screening results and visual observations. Field organic vapour analysis (OVA) field screening was completed using the RKI Eagle OVA gas detector and electric conductivity (EC) field screening was completed using a Spectrum Technologies Field Scout EC meter.

In order to avoid cross contamination, soil samples were "trimmed" by cutting away the outside surface and the sample was collected from the inner portion of the material. The assessor who handled soil wore disposable nitrile gloves.

Selected soil samples were placed into laboratory supplied sterile plastic bags and/or 250 mL clear glass jars for laboratory analyses. Sampling containers were stored in a temperature-controlled container, prior to being submitted to KaizenLAB in Calgary, Alberta. Standard chain-of-custody protocol was followed for samples collected. Soil samples were stored in an ice filled cooler prior to being submitted to an accredited laboratory. Soil samples that were not immediately analyzed were placed on hold, to allow for future analyses if required.

5.2 Analytical Schedule

Soil samples were analyzed for the following analytical parameters as displayed in Tables 1 to 3:

- Petroleum hydrocarbons (HCs);
- Detailed Salinity;
- Trace metals; and
- Dioxins and Furans.

5.3 Background Soil Conditions

Background soil conditions were assessed during the 2018 Phase II ESA. The control boreholes were advanced on Site to represent background conditions based on field observations. These boreholes were located near the northeast corner and south of the Site. All of the background borehole locations had similar soil profiles consisting of mainly 0.2 m to 0.5 m of topsoil overlaying gray-brown silty clay till.

Background HCs and dioxins and furans were all well below the referenced guidelines.

Background analytical results indicate EC and SAR ratings are within the "good" soil range for both topsoil and subsoil. The pH and metal parameters in the background soil samples were all well below the referenced guidelines. These results and referenced guidelines are presented in Table 2.





5.4 Soil Quality Assessment Guidelines

As described in the Phase II ESA (Action, 2018) the site soil profile generally consists of black topsoil overlaying a fine silty to sandy clay till. A dark brown sandy layer, that appears to be related to the historic waste disposal site, was noted from approximately 0.0 m to 1.0 m in the area of the south waste disposal pit. Debris, including but not limited to pieces of metal, glass, ceramics, plastic were noted in the area of the south waste disposal pit. Some evidence of iron staining and salt deposits was visible across the site. No odours were noted in any of the boreholes.

Based upon the land use and municipal zoning of the Site and surrounding area, the analytical results for soil samples were compared to the ABT1G and Alberta Tier 2 guidelines (ABT2G) for Commercial and Industrial land uses (AEP, 2019). Although the majority of the Site is characterized by fine grained soils the guidelines for coarse-grained soils were used as coarse-grained layers were noted near surface and therefore become the primary pathway for contaminant transport through the soils.

An adjustment to the guidelines was discussed with the Alberta Department of Environment and Parks. Based on site conditions, metals guidelines were adjusted, where applicable, to exclude the Ecological Protection of Freshwater Aquatic Life pathway as there are no surface water bodies within 300 m of the Site (ABT2G) as shown by the blue circle on the Water Well Map in Appendix B. With this guideline adjustment the applicable referenced guidelines applied are the commercial and industrial guidelines, Ecological Direct Soil Contact and Ecological Off-Site Migration pathways for the applicable metals as shown in Table 2. Ecological Off-Site Migration pathway is being applied for boron and zinc as the Ecological Direct Soil Contact pathway is not considered applicable to this site with regards to these metals, based on the following site-specific justifications:

- The Site is zoned for commercial or industrial purposes therefore vegetation growth at the site and impacts to the soil nutrient cycle are not of significant environmental importance as there will not likely be significant vegetation growth at the Site.
- As a commercial or industrial site soil and food ingestion by livestock and wildlife is not likely.
- Minimal impacts are expected to soil invertebrates as the elevated boron and zinc concentrations are located within a thin vertical and horizontal area at the limits of the excavation (based on information from the Phase II ESA and remedial sampling results) with non-impacted soil present both above and below the elevated boron and zinc levels. Soil invertebrates are expected to have minimal contact with the elevated boron and zinc concentrations in the soils.
- There are no surface water bodies or drinking water wells located within 300 m of these remaining boron concentrations.

Non-regulated soil parameters such as soluble calcium (Ca), chloride (Cl), magnesium (Mg), potassium (K), sodium (Na), and sulphate (S0₄) have been included in Table 2, as they are useful for assessing the origin of salt impact on soils.

5.5 Excavation Limit Sampling Activities

Remedial activities focused on the impacted areas as described above and visually impacted material noted in the former burn pit area. During excavation the burn pit material was noted as black, coarse grained sandy material with an odd odour. This material extended across much of the south half of the Site.

October 7 to 9, 2020 Action supervised the removal of 1973.10 tonnes of impacted materials (Appendix C) from the site. The excavation was limited to the south portion of the site and mainly concentrated around the former nuisance grounds burn area. 36 soil samples (SS20-01 to SS20-36) were collected from walls and base of the excavated areas (Figure 2). The soil samples were submitted to Kaizen Laboratories in Calgary, Alberta for HCs, detailed salinity; trace metals; and dioxins and furans.

From March 25 to 26, 2021 an additional 322.55 tonnes of soil were removed from the site (Appendix C). This was completed to removed boron levels above guideline levels remaining at the Site. Ten soil samples (SS21-37 to SS21-45) were collected from walls and base of the excavated area (Figure 2). The soil samples were submitted to Kaizen Laboratories in Calgary, Alberta for boron analysis.

The excavation in Area A, located near the southeast corner of the site, was approximately 10 by 10 m by 0.5 m in depth. The excavation of Areas B and C covered the area of the former burn pit and combined into an area of approximately 100 m by 80 m with depth ranging from 0.4 m to 1.75 m below ground surface. This excavation approached the south and west boundaries of the Site. The excavation details and sample locations are presented in Figure 2.

In July 2021 the excavations were backfilled with clean material from a location approximately 2 km south of the Site. Analytical data for the backfill is included in Appendix D (Fill Source #2 Analytical Report 312662).

5.6 Excavation Limit Analytical Results

The analytical results were compared to the Alberta Tier 1 and Tier 2 Soil Remediation Guidelines (ABT1G / ABT2G), January 2019, for coarse grained soils in commercial and industrial land use.

The analytical results indicated the following from the limits of the excavations:

- Hydrocarbon concentrations, including PAHs, were less than the applicable referenced guidelines and generally not detected (Table 1).
- Salinity parameters from the final excavation limits were within the applicable guidelines for commercial/industrical landuse with the exception of the following:
 - 16 of 27 final limit samples exceeded the commercial/industrical landuse guideline for EC. The majority of these samples were still within or better than the "poor" soil rating for both topsoil and subsoil.
 - Four limit soil samples exceeded the commercial/industrical landuse guideline for SAR. These four samples were only slightly greater than the guideline with the maximum SAR concentration at 14.15. This elevated SAR appears to be related to high sodium concentrations.
 - The excavation limits continue to have elevated sodium and sulphate as compared to apparent background soil conditions.
 - Chloride concentrations exceeding 500 mg/kg are noted in five of 27 final limit samples analyzed for chloride.
- Metals parameters were all less than the referenced guidelines with the exception of boron and zinc (Table 2).

- Boron exceeded the Ecological Direct Soil Contact pathway for 22 of the 42 samples analyzed. Of these samples, only one of them exceeded the Ecological Off-Site Migration pathway. The area with the sample exceeding the Ecological Off-Site Migration pathway was subsequently removed.
- In one analyzed sample Zinc exceeded the ecological direct soil contact pathway. This sample did not exceed the Ecological Off-Site Migration pathway.
- Dioxin and Furan concentrations were less than the referenced guidelines (Table 3).

5.7 Quality Control

Laboratory quality assurance/quality control (QA/QC) data, including replicate, blank and control samples, are provided in the appended analytical report. A review of the laboratory QA/QC data indicates that the batch analyses were consistent with generally accepted industry practices and that the results appear to support satisfactory data integrity.

6 SUMMARY

Smoky Lake County retained Action Land and Environmental Services Ltd. to conduct remedial activities at the former Waskatenau Nuisance Ground in Smoky Lake County, Alberta located at the SE of 16-059-19 W4M. These activities were conducted based on the Phase II Environmental Site Assessment completed by Action in 2018. Areas that were impacted by historic waste disposal activities at the Site were excavated and removed for disposal.

Three areas of concern, outlined in the Phase II ESA, were addressed during the remedial activity. These areas were located near the southeast corner of the Site, within the former "burn pit" area and extending northeast from the north end of the "burn pit". Contaminants of concern included metals, furans, dioxins, salinity, and hydrocarbons.

In October 2020 and March 2021 Action supervised the removal of 1973.10 tonnes and 322.55 tonnes, respectively, impacted materials from the site. Soil samples were taken from the limits of the excavation to confirm remedial success.

An adjustment to the guidelines was discussed with the Alberta Department of Environment and Parks. Based on site conditions, metals guidelines were adjusted, where applicable, to exclude the Ecological Protection of Freshwater Aquatic Life pathway as there are no surface water bodies within 300 m of the Site. With this guideline adjustment the applicable referenced guidelines applied are the commercial and industrial guidelines with Ecological Direct Soil Contact and Ecological Off-Site Migration pathways for the applicable metals. Ecological Off-Site Migration pathway is being applied for boron and zinc as the Ecological Direct Soil Contact pathway is not considered applicable to this site with regards to these metals, as described in Section 5.4.

Analytical results from samples from the excavation limits indicated the following:

- Hydrocarbon concentrations, including PAHs, were less than the applicable referenced guidelines and generally not detected.
- Salinity parameters from the final excavation limits were within the applicable guidelines for commercial/industrical landuse with the exception of the following:

- There were final limit samples which exceeded the commercial/industrical landuse guideline for EC. All of these samples were still within or better than the "poor" soil rating for both topsoil and subsoil.
- Four limit soil samples exceeded the commercial/industrial landuse guideline for SAR. These four samples were only slightly greater than the guidline with the maximum SAR concentration at 14.15.
- The excavation limits have elevated sodium and sulphate as compared to apparent background soil conditions.
- Chloride concentrations exceeding 500 mg/kg remain in five of the final limit samples analyzed for chloride.
- Metals parameters were all less than the referenced guidelines with the exception of boron and zinc.
 - Boron exceeded the Ecological Direct Soil Contact pathway for 22 of the 42 samples analyzed. Of these samples, only one of them exceeded the Ecological Off-Site Migration pathway. The area with the sample exceeding the Ecological Off-Site Migration pathway was subsequently removed.
 - In one analyzed sample Zinc exceeded the ecological direct soil contact pathway. This sample did not exceed the Ecological Off-Site Migration pathway.
- Dioxin and Furan concentrations were less than the referenced guidelines.

In July 2021 the excavation was backfilled with clean material from a location approximately 2 km south of the Site.

7 CONCLUSION

Elevated salinity, boron and zinc parameters remaining at the Site are expected to dissipate over time as the impacted source material has been removed. At this time these remaining impacts are not anticipated to cause significant environmental damage to the site or surrounding area and are not a concern to human health. This conclusion is based on the following:

- The heavily impacted source material has been removed therefore the remaining levels of salts and metals remaining at the Site are expected to decrease over time.
- Previously identified hydrocarbons, dioxins and furans noted at the Site during the Phase II ESA have been removed, thus removing concerns for human health.
- The site is zoned as Highway Commercial Land Use and The County has indicated that the future Site use will be Commercial or Light Industrial. Therefore impacts to vegetation growth, related soil nutrients and soil and food ingestion by livestock and wildlife are not likely a significant concern with regards to the elevated salinity or metals parameters.
- Soil invertebrates are expected to have minimal contact with the elevated boron and zinc concentrations in the soils as the elevated boron and zinc concentrations are located within a thin vertical and horizontal area at the limits of the excavation (based on information from the

Phase II ESA and remedial sampling results) with non-impacted soil present both above and below the elevated boron and zinc levels.

- There are no surface water bodies or water wells within 300 m of the Site.
- Phase II ESA drilling (2018) did not identify any statigraphy that would be indicative of a domestic use aquifer within 9 m of surface.
- The 2018 groundwater monitoring report indicates that shallow groundwater, in the groundwater monitoring wells, in the area of the excavation, has EC and chloride concentrations within commercial and industrial guidelines therefore the salinity at the site has not impacted the groundwater beyond applicable guidelines.
- Boron and zinc have not been identified as contaminates of concern in the groundwater therefore the environmental risk of the remaining boron and zinc at the Site is low.
- Borehole logs from the Phase II ESA show that soils are consistanly silty clay till from approximatley 1.5 m to at least 9 m below ground surface. Texture analysis from the Phase II ESA indicates that the soils are fine grained with a partical size analysis of 44.0% or less greater than 75 um.
- Phase II ESA and remediation results indicate that impacts are primarily situated in the shallow surface soils above approximately 1.75 m.

It is recommended that annual groundwater monitoring continue at the site to continue to track any changes to the Site and surrounding shallow groundwater.








Photograph 1 – Viewing north at site from northwest corner of excavation (Oct 9, 2020).




Photograph 2 – Viewing northeast at site (Oct 9, 2020).








SE of 16-059-19 W4M - Water Well Map



EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Smoky Lake County retained Action Land and Environmental Services Ltd. (Action) to conduct groundwater sampling at the former Waskatenau Nuisance Ground in Smoky Lake County, Alberta located within the SE of 16-059-19 W4M. The purpose of the groundwater sampling is to confirm, delineate, or demonstrate the absence of contamination of the groundwater within the former nuisance ground. Groundwater from seven groundwater monitoring wells at the Site was sampled in March 2021.

During 2018 the depths to groundwater ranged from 1.54 m bgs near the centre of the Site to 2.17 m bgs in the southeast corner of the Site. Shallow groundwater beneath the site was interpreted to flow toward the east-northeast.

Based on the 2018 sampling only salinity parameters were analyzed in 2021 as they were determined to be the contaminates of concern.

The laboratory analytic results indicate that sodium was slightly elevated in three samples, chloride was elevated in three samples, and sulphate was elevated in six samples. The remaining laboratory results were all less than the applicable guideline values.

Generally all the parameters tested in March 2021, were higher in concentration than they were during the November 2018 water sampling event. This is likely a seasonal phenomenon and due to the lack of downward infiltration of rain water or snow melt based on the time of year and winter soil and surface moisture conditions.

Elevated chloride ion concentrations near the north boundary of the Site exceed the applicable guidelines for groundwater and due to their proximity to the highway and the major intersection appear to most likely related to salt impacts related to road salts from the adjacent highway intersection. This may also be what is impacting BH18-05 resulting in elevated chloride concentrations.

If the elevated chloride and sodium noted in the groundwater at the Site are related to the historic nuisance ground activities, then it is expected that these concentrations will begin to decline with time since the source of the impacts has been removed.

The elevated sulphate concentrations are elevated across the site and are considered naturally occurring and not a result of the historic landfill activities.

Elevated sodium, chloride and sulphate concentrations noted in the groundwater at the Site are not considered to be a threat to aquatic life or potable water based on the following:

- Shallow groundwater beneath the site was interpreted to flow toward the east-northeast;
- The nearest groundwater well is 426 m northwest of the Site;
- The closest groundwater well in the direction of groundwater flow is located 585 m northeast of the Site; and
- The nearest water bodies are Waskatenau Creek approximately 350 m northeast and east of the site and a small wetland area located approximately 340 m southeast of the Site.

It is recommended that groundwater at the Site be monitored and sampled for at least one more year to confirm shallow groundwater quality and remedial success of the Site.



1 INTRODUCTION

Smoky Lake County (The County) retained Action Land and Environmental Services Ltd. (Action) to conduct groundwater sampling for the former Waskatenau Nuisance Ground in Smoky Lake County, Alberta located at the SE of 16-059-19 W4M, hereafter referred to as 'Site'. The purpose of the sampling is to monitor and track the groundwater condition at the Site.

1.1 STANDARDS AND METHODOLOGY

The Groundwater monitoring was performed in general accordance with the following documents:

- American Society for Testing and Materials (ASTM). 1999. *Standard Guide for Purging Methods for Wells Used for Ground-Water Quality Investigations*. West Conshohocken, Pennsylvania;

- Canadian Standards Association (CSA). 2008. Phase II ESA Standard Z769-00 (CSA, 2008);
- Government of Alberta, Alberta Environmental and Parks (AEP). 2019. Alberta Tier 1 Soil and Groundwater Remediation Guidelines. Land Policy Branch, Policy and Planning Division (AEP, 2019);
- Government of Alberta, Alberta Environmental and Parks (AEP). 2019. *Alberta Tier 2 Soil and Groundwater Remediation Guidelines*. Land Policy Branch, Policy and Planning Division (AEP, 2019); and

1.2 OBJECTIVE

The objective of the groundwater sampling was to assess potential environmental concerns related to historical operations at the Site and to confirm, delineate, or demonstrate the absence of contamination. Data collected from the groundwater sampling is used to continue ongoing investigation of shallow groundwater conditions at the Site.

1.3 SCOPE OF WORK

The scope of work for the groundwater sampling was prepared based upon the potential environmental concerns identified during a Phase 2 ESA (Action 2018). The scope of work comprised of the following tasks:

- Conducted groundwater sampling activities at the groundwater monitoring wells previously installed at the Site;
- Collect groundwater samples from the wells and place in laboratory supplied bottles;



- Submitted selected groundwater samples for laboratory analysis of detailed salinity parameters; and
- Prepare a report summarizing the findings of the groundwater sampling and provide recommendations as required.

2 SITE CHARACTERIZATION

2.1 SITE DESCRIPTION

The Site is located within the SE of 16-059-19 W4M, approximately 110 m north of the northern limits of the Town of Waskatenau and approximately 19 km west of Smoky Lake, Alberta within Smoky Lake County. The Site is 152.4 m by 102.3 m (3.85 acre, 1.56 hectares). The Site is currently a vacant lot with a ground cover of various grasses and weeds.

The Site is the location of the former nuisance ground that was utilized by the Town of Waskatenau. It has been decommissioned, backfilled, and reclaimed. A number of underground oil and/or gas pipelines are located at the Site, near the north boundary and ditch. The Site is presented on Figure 1, Site Location Plan and Figure 2, Site Figure with Approximate Borehole Locations.

Currently the Site location is zoned as Highway Commercial Land Use and The County has indicated that the future Site use will be Commercial or Light Industrial.

2.2 SURROUNDING LAND USE

North of the site, across Highway 28, is a commercial property consisting of a gas station and various businesses. East of the Site is an industrial property utilized by a construction company. West of the Site is a gravel road and cultivated farmland. South of the Site is a tame hay crop. The nearest water bodies are Waskatenau Creek located approximately 350 m northeast and east of the site and a small wetland area located approximately 340 m southeast of the Site.

2.3 WATER WELL RECORDS

Water well records on file with Abacus Datagraphics (Abadata) were searched within an approximate 1,600 m radius of the Site. One domestic and stock well, 14 domestic water wells, five municipal wells, and eight water wells of unknown or "other" use were reported within the search area. Water well records are available in Appendix A.

Water well depths ranged between 40 ft to 500 ft (12 m to 152 m). The lithology, where reported, generally consisted of clay at the surface, underlain by interbedded shale, sand and/or sandstone to the reported depths.

The nearest water wells appear to be located as follows:

NW 16-059-19 W4M – Four wells, drilled between 1979 and 1998 for domestic use. These wells
are expected to be associated with the farmyard located approximately 426 m northwest of the
Site.



- NE 16-059-19 W4M Eight wells, drilled between 1965 and 1996 for domestic and unknown use. These wells are expected to be associated with the farmyard located approximately 585 m northeast of the Site.
- SW 16-059-19 W4M Two wells, drilled in 1961 and 1973 for domestic use. These wells are expected to be associated with the farmyard located approximately 794 m southwest of the Site.

Depths of these wells range from 22.8 m to 109.73 m below ground surface. Well records from these well do not indicate water depth or depth to a pump.

2.4 TOPOGRAPHY AND DRAINAGE

Local topography of the general area of the Site is classified as an undulating, high relief with a limiting slope of 4% (ASIV). Local topography at the Site is generally flat with an approximate elevation of approximately 635 m above sea level (AbaData). Local drainage appears to be controlled by a gentle slope to the south towards the town of Waskatenau.

2.5 GEOLOGY AND HYDROGEOLOGY

The underlying bedrock in the area is comprised of the Upper Cretaceous, Belly River Group. These deposits are fine- to coarse-grained, marginally marine to nonmarine, interbedded sandstone, grey to brown carbonaceous siltstone, and coal seams (Prior, 2013).

The surficial geology in the area is generally Pleistocene, stagnation moraine sediments composed of mainly till with even thickness, local water-sorted material up to 30 m. This area is characterized by undulating topography with local relief generally less than 3 m (Shetson, 1990).

Water in the area of the Site is generally obtained from the Wapiti Formation. Yields range from 4.5 litres/minute (L/min) to 22.7 L/min. Groundwater quality in the area of the Site is generally good with mainly calcium bicarbonate and low sulfate and chloride levels. Chemically sulphate generally constitutes more than 60% of the anions, sodium and potassium generally constitute more than 60% of the cations and total dissolved solids are generally an average of 2000 parts per million (ppm). The groundwater level elevation in the area of the Site is described as averaging 60 m and the flow direction is generally flowing towards the North Saskatchewan River to the south (Borneuf, 1973).

The chemical quality of the groundwater from the surficial deposits with in the County is high in natural sulphate in areas where there are elevated levels of total dissolved solids (TDS). Through most of the region chloride ions concentration is less than 100 mg/L (HCL, 1998).

Groundwater in the nearby Cold Lake-Bonnyville region and the Edmonton area has been reported as having natural arsenic and manganese levels as high as 0.02 mg/L and 2.5 mg/L, respectively (Fennell, 2017) (Water Canada, 2014) (Health Canada, 2017).



A study conducted on the groundwater in the Beaver River Watershed, located directly northeast of the Site, indicates that uranium and arsenic are present at levels greater than the applicable referenced guidelines in a large number of shallow domestic water wells from the area. It states that these levels are naturally occurring in water from overlying glacial sediments in the basin, are the result of weathering of the till/clay deposits and are not due to industrial or other activities (BRWA, 2011) (Welsh, 2009) (Moncur, 2010).

2.6 SOIL DESCRIPTION

The Site is located within the Elk Point Ecodistrict, Boreal Transition Eco Region, within the Dry Mixedwood Natural SubRegion of the Boreal Forest natural Region (ABADATA, 2018), (Downing and Pettapiece, 2006). The soils in the area are classified as Black-Dark Gray Chernozem on Dark Gray Luvisol. Specifically, the soils are classified in the Rolly View and UNCAS series. Both series soils are described as well-drained, moderately fine textured, moderately calcareous and non-saline till (ASIV, 2016), (ABADATA, 2018).

3 PREVIOUS ENVIRONMENTAL REPORTS

The report titled *Phase I Environmental Site Assessment - Waskatenau Nuisance Grounds*, prepared by Associated Environmental Alberta Ltd., April 2016, was reviewed prior to the groundwater monitoring. This report concluded the following:

- A former landfill/waste disposal area is present at the site with waste disposal activities estimated to have occurred over 50 years ago;
- There is a high potential for contamination for soil, soil vapor and/or groundwater at the Site;
- A burn pit was discovered at the Site;
- Historic wastes at the site are described as car parts and municipal wastes; and
- There is possible hydrocarbon contamination related to a gas station located north of the Site.

The report titled *Phase 2 Environmental Site Assessment for Former Waskatenau Nuisance Grounds*, prepared by Action, October 2018, was reviewed prior to the groundwater monitoring. This report concluded the following:

- F3 hydrocarbons, PAHs, EC, sodium absorption ratio (SAR), metals, dioxins and furans exceeding the applicable referenced guidelines were found in soil samples from the site with the major area of significant impacts being the former burn pit;
- Further remedial work is recommended to address the impacts noted across the Site; and
- Groundwater should be monitored and sampled to help further determine the extent of the impacts and help in the development of a suitable remedial action plan.

Groundwater Monitoring Report for Former Waskatenau Nuisance Ground Smoky Lake County, Alberta SE 16-059-19 W4M, Action Land & Environmental Services Ltd., January 2019

• Groundwater from seven groundwater monitoring wells at the Site was monitored and sampled.



- At the time of sampling depths to groundwater ranged from 1.54 m bgs near the centre of the Site to 2.17 m bgs in the southeast corner of the Site. Shallow groundwater beneath the site was interpreted to flow toward the east-northeast.
- The laboratory analytic results indicate that EC, manganese and uranium exceeded referenced ABT1G in all the monitoring wells. Of the seven monitoring wells sampled at the Site chloride was elevated in four, sulphate was elevated in five, and arsenic was elevated in two of the samples.
- Typical tracer chemicals/indicator parameters for landfill leachate are chloride, sodium and sulphate (BCE, 2019). The chemical quality of the groundwater from the surficial deposits within some areas of Smoky Lake County contain high levels of sulphate (HCL, 1998) so the elevated sulphate concentrations at the Site are considered naturally occurring and not a result of the historic landfill activities. The elevated EC is likely a result of the naturally occurring elevated sulphates.
- Through most of the region the chloride ion concentration is generally less than 100 mg/L (HCL, 1998). The elevated chloride in the centre and northeast corner of the Site may be the result of leachate from the historic waste disposal/landfill activities at the Site.
- Naturally elevated levels of arsenic, manganese and uranium are common in the area, therefore the levels of arsenic, manganese and uranium in the groundwater at the site, above the referenced guidelines, are likely naturally occurring.
- The laboratory results report hydrocarbon, dioxin and furans and PAH parameters from all wells were below applicable guideline values and generally non-detectable. The remaining laboratory results were all less than the applicable guideline values.

File and Data Review, Action Land & Environmental Services Ltd., August 2020

- Data from the two previously referenced reports was reviewed and compared against the new January 2019 Alberta Tier 1 Soil Remediation Guidelines (ABT1G). During this review landuse was revised to commercial and industrial with respect to the guidelines used based on municipal land zoning and future landuse plans for the Site.
- Further review of the groundwater information indicated that MW18-04 was not likely representative of background groundwater conditions and target chloride concentrations in groundwater has been adjusted to 250 mg/L based on the exclusion of the Ecological Aquatic Life Pathway. Electrical conductivity guidelines have also been disregarded based on current and future land zoning of Commercial or Light Industrial as described by The County.

Remediation Report for Former Waskatenau Nuisance Ground Smoky Lake County, Alberta SE 16-059-19 W4M, Action Land & Environmental Services Ltd., July 2021

- Areas that were impacted by historic waste disposal activities at the Site were excavated and removed for disposal. Contaminants of concern included metals, furans, dioxins, salinity, and hydrocarbons.
- In October 2020 and March 2021 a total of 2,295.65 tonnes impacted materials was removed from the site.



- Based on site conditions, guidelines were adjusted, where applicable, to exclude the Ecological Protection of Freshwater Aquatic Life pathway as there are no surface water bodies within 300 m of the Site. With this guideline adjustment the applicable referenced guidelines applied are the commercial and industrial guidelines with Ecological Direct Soil Contact and Ecological Off-Site Migration pathways for the applicable metals. Ecological Off-Site Migration pathway is being applied for boron and zinc as the Ecological Direct Soil Contact pathway is not considered applicable to this site with regards to these metals.
- Analytical results from the excavation limits indicated the following:
 - Hydrocarbon concentrations, including PAHs, and Dioxin and Furan concentrations were less than the applicable referenced guidelines and generally not detected.
 - Salinity parameters from the final excavation limits were within the applicable guidelines for commercial/industrical landuse with the exception of the following:
 - There were final limit samples which exceeded the commercial/industrical landuse guideline for EC. All of these samples were still within or better than the "poor" soil rating for both topsoil and subsoil.
 - Four limit soil samples exceeded the commercial/industrial landuse guideline for SAR. These four samples were only slightly greater than the guidline with the maximum SAR concentration at 14.15.
 - The excavation limits have elevated sodium and sulphate as compared to apparent background soil conditions.
 - Chloride concentrations exceeding 500 mg/kg remain in five of the final limit samples analyzed for chloride.
 - Metals parameters were all less than the referenced guidelines with the exception of boron and zinc.
 - Boron exceeded the Ecological Direct Soil Contact pathway for 22 of the 42 samples analyzed. Of these samples, only one of them exceeded the Ecological Off-Site Migration pathway. The area with the sample exceeding the Ecological Off-Site Migration pathway was subsequently removed.
 - In one analyzed sample Zinc exceeded the ecological direct soil contact pathway. This sample did not exceed the Ecological Off-Site Migration pathway.
- In July, 2021 the excavation was backfilled with clean material from a location approximately 2 km south of the Site.
- Elevated salinity, boron and zinc parameters remaining at the Site are expected to dissipate over time as the impacted source material has been removed. At this time these remaining impacts are not anticipated to cause significant environmental damage to the site or surrounding area and are not a concern to human health.
- It was recommended that annual groundwater monitoring continue at the site to continue to track any changes to the Site and surrounding shallow groundwater.



4 Groundwater Monitoring and Sampling

4.1 METHODOLOGY

The groundwater sampling methodology was based upon the Standards and Methods identified in Section 1.1. Monitoring well locations are shown on Figures 2 and 3 and field and laboratory reported results are summarized in Tables 1 and 2.

Groundwater samples were obtained on March 25, 2021. Stagnant water was removed/purged so that formation water can be sampled. As per standard methods, three well volumes of water were removed from the groundwater wells prior to sampling. Groundwater samples were collected using dedicated, disposable PVC bailers, placed in sterile, laboratory-supplied sample containers, and transported in ice-cooled containers following appropriate handling, labeling and chain-of-custody procedures. The samples were submitted to Kaizen Environmental laboratory in Calgary, Alberta for analysis.

4.2 ANALYTICAL SCHEDULE

The analytical schedule was based upon potential chemical parameters identified during the Phase 2 ESA and 2018 Groundwater monitoring and sampling event. Groundwater samples were analyzed for detailed salinity parameters as outlined in Table 2.

4.3 WATER QUALITY ASSESSMENT GUIDELINES

Visual inspection of soil from the Site indicates that the dominant soils of the Site consists of black topsoil overlaying a fine silty to sandy clay till. Based upon the land use of the Site and surrounding area, the analytical results for the groundwater samples were compared to the Alberta Tier 1 Guidelines (ABT1G), for coarse-grained soils, based on the results of the referenced Phase 2 ESA. Results were compared to the Commercial and Industrial Guidelines for the Potable Water Pathway as the Aquatic Life Pathway has been excluded as there are no surface water bodies within 300 m of the Site (AEP, 2019).

Values in the data table (Table 2) that exceed applicable guidelines have been highlighted. Nonregulated water parameters have been included, as they are useful for assessing related impact on groundwater and impacts from the Site activities.

4.4 GROUNDWATER MONITORING AND ANALYTICAL RESULTS

Depths to groundwater measured in 2018 ranged from 1.54 m below ground surface (bgs) (MW18-05) to 2.17 m bgs (MW18-04) at the time of sampling (Table 1). Shallow groundwater beneath the site was interpreted to flow toward the east-northeast (Figure 3). The monitoring well logs are included in Appendix B.



The laboratory analytic results (Table 2) indicate that the following exceedances greater than the referenced ABT1G:

- Sodium MW18-01, MW18-03, and MW18-04;
- Chloride MW18-01, MW18-02, and MW18-05;
- Sulphate MW18-01, MW18-03, MW18-04, MW18-05, MW18-06 and MW18-07;

The remaining laboratory results were all less than the applicable guideline values (Table 2). Laboratory reports are included in Appendix C).

4.5 QUALITY CONTROL

Laboratory quality assurance/quality control (QA/QC) data, including replicate, blank and control samples, are provided in the appended analytical reports. A review of the laboratory QA/QC data indicates that the batch analyses were consistent with generally accepted industry practices and that the results appear to support satisfactory data integrity.

5 SUMMARY AND DISCUSSION

Groundwater from seven groundwater monitoring wells at the Site was sampled in March 2021.

The laboratory analytic results indicate that sodium was slightly elevated in three samples, chloride was elevated in three samples, and sulphate was elevated in six samples.

Typical tracer chemicals/indicator parameters for landfill leachate are chloride, sodium and sulphate (BCE, 2019). The chemical quality of the groundwater from the surficial deposits within some areas of Smoky Lake County contain high levels of sulphate (HCL, 1998) so the elevated sulphate concentrations at the Site are considered within a naturally occurring range and may not be the result of the historic landfill activities.

Generally all the parameters tested in March 2021, were higher in concentration than they were during the November 2018 water sampling event. This is likely a seasonal phenomenon and due to the lack of downward infiltration of rain water or snow melt based on the time of year and winter soil and surface moisture conditions.

6 CONCLUSIONS

The groundwater monitoring identified environmental impacts in the shallow groundwater across the Site.

Elevated chloride ion concentrations near the north boundary of the Site exceed the applicable guidelines for groundwater and due to their proximity to the highway and the major intersection appear to most likely related to salt impacts related to road salts from the adjacent highway intersection. This may also be what is impacting BH18-05 resulting in elevated chloride concentrations.



If the elevated chloride and sodium noted in the groundwater at the Site are related to the historic nuisance ground activities, then it is expected that these concentrations will begin to decline with time since the source of the impacts has been removed.

The elevated sulphate concentrations are elevated across the site and are considered naturally occurring and not a result of the historic landfill activities.

Elevated sodium, chloride and sulphate concentrations noted in the groundwater at the Site are not considered to be a threat to aquatic life or potable water based on the following:

- Shallow groundwater beneath the site was interpreted to flow toward the east-northeast;
- The nearest groundwater well is 426 m northwest of the Site;
- The closest groundwater well in the direction of groundwater flow is located 585 m northeast of the Site; and
- The nearest water bodies are Waskatenau Creek approximately 350 m northeast and east of the site and a small wetland area located approximately 340 m southeast of the Site.

It is recommended that groundwater at the Site be monitored and sampled for at least one more year to confirm shallow groundwater quality and remedial success of the Site.

7 QUALIFICATIONS OF THE PROJECT TEAM

The field assessment was completed by Devin Thingvold, ATT. Devin has more than five years of experience as an environmental technician working on Phase I and II, vegetation, soil and site assessments; water sampling; remediation, reclamation and vegetation control.

8 CLOSURE

This report was prepared by Action for the Smoky Lake County. The material in this report reflects the best judgment considering the information available at the time of preparation. Any use which a third party makes of this report, or any reliance on or decisions to be made based on it, are the responsibility of such third parties.

The interpretations and conclusions contained herein are based on data derived from a sampling program, where a limited number of soil samples were collected at widely spaced intervals. The sampling method determines surface and subsurface conditions at specific locations where samples were taken and where in-situ tests were conducted, only at the time they were obtained and to the depths penetrated. The samples and tests cannot be relied upon to accurately reflect the nature and extent of variations that exist between sampling and testing locations.



At this meeting, Minister McIver indicated to us that the Province would be assisting with the reclamation costs of the former nuisance ground as the lands were once owned by the Province. To date, we have yet to receive written confirmation from the Minister's office regarding this commitment. We are hoping to proceed with the reclamation work as soon as possible in an effort to put Albertans back to work following the disruption caused by the COVID-19 pandemic.

Are you able to provide the County with an update as to when we can expect to receive said correspondence from the Minister?



INFORMATION REQUIREMENT

Section 13 of the *Subdivision and Development Regulation* defines the setback distance required from a subdivision development for a residence, school, hospital, or food establishment to a non-operating landfill. The Regulation allows the subdivision or development authority to vary regulated setback distance upon receiving written consent from Alberta Environment and Sustainable Resource Development.

Considerations for consent

Alberta Environment and Sustainable Resource Development (ESRD) will consider a consent to lessen the setback distance from developments near non-operating landfills, based on the following criteria:

- 1. All Information Requirements set out in this document must be submitted to ESRD by the subdivision or development authority;
- 2. The subdivision or development authority commits to developing a mechanism whereby future property owners are made aware of any consents issued;
- 3. Consent will not be considered when all three of the following conditions exist:
 - a. Gas levels above background are present within the waste disposal area of the landfill;
 - b. The land area where development is to occur has no natural physical barrier to gas movement i.e. a valley between the development and the landfill; and
 - c. The development has underground infrastructure or basements
- 4. Where groundwater has been contaminated, consent will only be considered where:
 - a. potable water to the proposed development is being supplied from a municipal system; and
 - b. vegetation, or other receptors or property will not be affected by the contaminated groundwater

Consent after development

Consent to lessen the setback distance will not be considered after a development permit or subdivision approval has been issued by the local authority.

Information Requirements:

The following information is required to be provided to ESRD by the <u>subdivision or development</u> <u>authority</u> before ESRD will consider consenting to a variance request for a development near a non-operating landfill:

- 1. A covering letter from the subdivision or development authority requesting a variance.
- 2. A letter of consent from the landfill owner consenting to the encroachment.
- 3. A letter from the proponent (developer) stating the reasons the site must encroach the landfill setback and the alternatives if the variance is not granted.
- 4. Details of the type of development within the setback (including proposed design, water supply, wastewater and stormwater systems, topography, location of proposed residences, schools, etc.).



Government of Alberta

Only the subdivision or development authority may submit a request for variance

Consent must be provided before proceeding with any development not adhering to landfill setback requirements.

ITEM 4.3 - ATTACHMENT #5 - Page 2 of 2 Requesting Consent To Vary The Setback Distance For A Development To A Non Operating Landfill

INFORMATION REQUIREMENT

May 2013 Information Requirements cont.:

- 5. Department of Health Permit Number or Alberta Environment and Sustainable Resource Development approval or registration number of the landfill being encroached upon.
- 6. An engineering report*, completed by a professional registered with APEGA, that includes, as a minimum, the following information:
 - a) landfill cell delineation including approximate waste depth (use of test pits, historical aerial photography, etc.),
 - b) duration of operation (actual, or estimated if actual not available),
 - c) amount, types of waste, and degree of waste stabilization in the landfill,
 - d) landfill topography for site drainage,
 - e) landfill final cover details such as thickness and composition,
 - a visual inspection report that details, at a minimum, vegetative stress and degree of cover, landfill settlement, exposed refuse, leachate breakout, and any other visually notable landfill issues,
 - g) regional and site specific geology and hydrogeology,\
 - h) a map showing all water wells and residences within a 1 kilometre radius of the site and other topographical features, such as water bodies, within 5 kilometres of the site,
 - i) the applicable sections of the area structure plan documenting the zoning and expected use of the landfill and surrounding area,
 - j) groundwater monitoring results,
 - k) landfill gas monitoring results,
 - I) an opinion on whether encroachment is feasible (under what mitigative measures, to what distance, etc.), and
 - m) if mitigative measures are proposed, the design details, monitoring, and maintenance program for the mitigative measures.
- 7. Documentation from the Alberta Health Services that they have provided or refused the variance to construct a private water well within the 450-metre setback as per the Public Health Regulations, if applicable. (Water wells also have a setback requirement under Public Health jurisdiction. Any development with a water well will require both waivers before it can proceed.)
- 8. Documentation on how the development authority will deal with potential complaints from any residents within the setback.
- 9. Documentation on how the development authority will convey information on the setback variance to existing and successive property owners.
- 10. A letter from Alberta Health Services confirming that they have no concerns with the proposed development.

*The subdivision or development authority must utilize applicable sections of the current Standards and Guidelines for Landfills in Alberta to develop the information required in (6).

SMOKY LAKE COUNTY IN THE PROVINCE OF ALBERTA BYLAW NO. 1289-16

A Bylaw of Smoky Lake County, in the Province of Alberta for the purpose of adopting an Intermunicipal Development Plan for Smoky Lake County & the Town of Smoky Lake.

WHEREAS an Intermunicipal Development Plan has been prepared for the Town of Smoky Lake and Smoky Lake County based on public input and studies of land use, development and other relevant data; and

WHEREAS the foresaid Intermunicipal Development Plan describes the way in which the future development within the Plan area may be carried out in an orderly and economic manner;

NOW THEREFORE the Council of Smoky Lake County, duly assembled, and pursuant to the authority conferred upon it by the Municipal Government Act R.S.A. 2000, c. M-26 as amended, enacts as follows:

- 1. This new Bylaw may be cited as "Smoky Lake County & the Town of Smoky Lake Intermunicipal Development Plan".
- 2. Smoky Lake County & the Town of Smoky Lake Intermunicipal Development Plan is attached hereto as Schedule "A" to this Bylaw is hereby adopted.
- 3. This Bylaw may be amended by Bylaw in accordance with the Municipal Government Act R.S.A. 2000, c. M-26, as amended.

This Bylaw comes into effect upon the date of the final reading thereof.

1 Interpretation

1.1 Definitions

- 1. Area Structure Plan is a statutory plan that establishes the general planning framework for future subdivision and development of an area of undeveloped land.
- 2. **Building** includes anything, whether temporary or permanent, constructed or placed on, in, over, or under land but does not include a highway or road or a bridge forming part of a highway or road;
- 3. **Confined Feeding Operation** means fenced or enclosed land or buildings where livestock are confined for the purpose of growing, sustaining, finishing or breeding by means other than grazing and any other building or structure directly related to that purpose but does not include residences, livestock seasonal feeding and bedding sites, equestrian stables, auction markets, race tracks or exhibition grounds. Confined Feeding Operations are regulated under the Agricultural Operation Practices Act (AOPA) in Alberta.
- 4. Development means:
 - a. an excavation or stockpile and the creation of either of them, or
 - b. a building or an addition to or replacement or repair of a building and the construction or placing of any of them in, on, over or under land, or
 - c. a change of use of land or a building or an act done in relation to land or a building that results in or is likely to result in a change in the use of the land or building, or
 - d. a change in the intensity of use of land or a building or an act done in relation to land or a building that results in or is likely to result in a change in the intensity of use of the land or building;
- 5. **Development Authority** means the Development Authority established by the Town of Smoky Lake and the Smoky Lake County Development Authority Bylaws;
- 6. **Environmental Reserve** means land considered undevelopable because of its natural features or location (e.g., unstable slopes, shoreline areas, etc.) that is

dedicated to the municipality at the time of subdivision by the landowner, as provided for in the Municipal Government Act;

- 7. Environmental Reserve Easement is an easement that is registered on the title of a parcel of land in favour of the municipality for the purpose of the protection and enhancement of the environment;
- 8. **Farmstead** means the currently inhabited or formerly inhabited residence or other improvements connected with a farm or an intensive agricultural use. Farmstead also includes a currently vacant site, which is intended to be used as a country residence;
- 9. **Fragmented Parcel** means a parcel of land or a part of a parcel of land that is separated from the balance of the parcel of land by a natural barrier such as a river or coulee, or by a physical barrier such as a road, railroad, or highway;
- 10. **Multi-lot Country Residential Development** means any subdivision, which will create five (5) or more country residential or farmstead lots on a quarter section.
- 11. **Municipal Reserve** is land (or cash-in-lieu of land, or both) dedicated by a landowner to the municipality at the time of subdivision for the purpose of providing parks, recreation facilities and school sites as provided for in the Municipal Government Act;
- 12. **Public Utility** means a public utility, as defined in the Act. More specifically, a public utility means:
 - a. a system, works, plant, equipment or service for the production, transmission, delivery or furnishing of water, heat, light or power supplied by means other than electricity, either directly or indirectly to or for the public;
 - b. an oil pipeline the proprietor of which is declared by the Energy Resources Conservation Commission to be a common carrier; and
 - c. an electric utility; (Section 1(i) Public Utilities Act 2010 as Consolidated).

2 Introduction

2.1 Purpose

The four (4) partner municipalities within the Smoky Lake Region (the Town of Smoky Lake, the Village of Vilna, the Village of Waskatenau, and Smoky Lake County) are actively working together to achieve three regional collaboration initiatives. The three initiatives are:

Initiative 1	Consult, develop, communicate and implement a new and expanded terms of reference for a regional economic and community development advisory committee (RCDC).
Initiative 2	Communicate and provide shared regional services in the critical areas of business counselling, retention and growth planning assistance; business/investment attraction; tourism promotion and attraction and overall economic and community development capacity building.
Initiative 3	Consult, develop, communicate and integrate initiatives that address the need for more effective regional and/or inter-municipal growth, land use, infrastructure, recreation, social and emergency services planning and possible or increased joint service provision.

The purpose of this intermunicipal development plan is to identify and communicate a plan for improving regional collaboration in the areas of intermunicipal growth, land use, infrastructure, recreation, social and emergency services planning, and joint service provision, as outlined in Initiative 3.

During the preparation of this intermunicipal development plan, the following deliverables were agreed upon by the partner municipalities:

- To develop and implement a community and stakeholder consultation program.
- To draft a municipal planning, development, and regulatory framework recommendations report and strategy.
- To consult with Council, key stakeholders, residents and the regional community economic development committee.

- To prepare a final municipal planning, development and regulatory framework recommendations report and plan.
- To prepare a 'Go-Forward' report and recommendation for the community economic development committee to implement the recommendations.

Initiative 3 was accomplished through the development of three (3) intermunicipal development strategies – the Town of Smoky Lake + Smoky Lake County Intermunicipal Development Strategy (this document), the Village of Vilna + Smoky Lake County Intermunicipal Development Strategy, and the Village of Waskatenau + Smoky lake County Intermunicipal Development Strategy. These documents were structured so that in order to further their implementation they could be approved by the respective Councils of the partner municipalities as Intermunicipal Development Plans.

The adoption of this Intermunicipal Development Plan represents the implementation of the recommendations in the 'Go-Forward' Report and provides the Town and the County with a joint future land use plan to help guide growth and development within the plan area.

2.2 Approach

This plan utilizes a comprehensive approach to land-use planning. In practice, this means that local information, specialized viewpoints and environmental stewardship practices are used in the decision-making process for land use and development.

This approach takes into account both the past and present human and physical environments. Considering where the community has been, where it is presently and where it wants to go enables both municipalities to set in place a plan for how to reach their desired destination. This approach to planning assumes that the plan's policies and subsequent decisions will be based on careful consideration of environmental information, stakeholder interests and municipal goals and objectives. This approach offers communities the opportunity to provide widelyaccepted and lasting solutions to development and land use management issues.

2.3 Goals

The goals of this plan are to assist the Town and County achieve the following short and long term benefits:

Short Term Benefits

- Provide all municipalities within the Town and County with a service delivery tool or strategy to assist with determining the viability of regional municipal service delivery;
- Develop a new committee/board to better facilitate inter-municipal and intra-regional cooperation relating to economic AND community development issues, opportunities, and challenges;
- Increase overall community and economic development capacity building essential for both short term and longer term community viability, sustainability, and quality of life; and
- Develop a more effective process and planning strategy for coordinating intermunicipal growth, land use, infrastructure, recreation, social services, and emergency services.

Long Term Benefits

- The development and implementation of a regional framework that strengthens regional collaboration and integrated regional service delivery models to increase efficiencies and provide a stronger, more unified approach to addressing the issues identified as important to community members within the Smoky Lake Region;
- Increased business/investment attraction "presence" throughout the Smoky Lake Region;
- Improved business retention, growth, and business attraction throughout the region;
- Improved regional fiscal and financial sustainability; and
- Increased opportunities for leveraging regional strengths into regional competitive advantages.

ntroduction

2.4 Enactment

The policies contained within this plan come into force once the Councils of the Town of Smoky Lake and Smoky Lake County have each given Third Reading to the bylaws adopting the Town of Smoky Lake + Smoky Lake County Intermunicipal Development Plan.

2.5 Duration

This plan will establish, in general terms, the general land use patterns, together with the conditions upon which the provision of municipal services may occur in the subject area, and mutually agreed policy directions for the next 25 years following the adoption of the plan. While this plan is meant to be a long range planning document, it is intended that regular monitoring, review, and periodic amendments may be required for policies in the plan to remain current with changing development trends and growth within the region.

A process for amending the plan has been established as a part of this plan.

This plan also provides a "sunset clause" – a time at which the plan will cease to have any force and effect should the two municipalities not re-adopt the plan. Notwithstanding these processes, the plan should be reviewed every three years from the date on which the plan comes into effect to ensure that it is still current and meets the needs of the Town of Smoky Lake, Smoky Lake County, and the entire Smoky Lake Region.

2.6 Enabling Legislation

The provincial legislation that allows one or more municipalities to adopt an Intermunicipal Development Plan is the Municipal Government Act.

Section 631 of the Municipal Government Act states, in part:

Two or more councils may, by each passing a bylaw . . . adopt an intermunicipal development plan to include those areas of land lying within the boundaries of the municipalities as they consider necessary.

- (1) An intermunicipal development plan
 - (a) may provide for;
 - (i) the future land use within the area,

- (ii) the manner of and the proposals for future development in the area, and
- (iii) any other matter relating to the physical, social or economic development of the area that the councils consider necessary,

and

- (b) must include
 - (i) a procedure to be used to resolve or attempt to resolve any conflict between the municipalities that have adopted the plan,
 - (ii) a procedure to be used, by one or more municipalities, to amend or repeal the plan, and
 - (iii) provisions relating to the administration of the plan.

The procedure for adopting an Intermunicipal Development Plan is described in Section 692 of the Municipal Government Act.

2.7 Subject Area Boundary

The lands within the Town of Smoky Lake and Smoky Lake County to which this plan applies are identified on Map 5.1 – Future Land Use Concept.

2.8 Subject Area Profile

Location and History

The Town of Smoky Lake is located approximately 115 km north-east of the City of Edmonton, approximately 80 km north-east of the Alberta's Industrial Heartland area, and approximately 175 km west of Cold Lake. Historically, the Town has served as an agricultural service centre for the surrounding area. It continues to provide important social, educational, health, and business services to neighbouring rural and agricultural communities.

With the removal of the rail line through Smoky Lake and the demolition of the grain elevators, an important element of the Town's agricultural services ended. The transformation of the rail line into the Iron Horse Trail, a multi-use trail system managed and maintained by a not-for-profit organization representing the ten

municipalities through which the trail passes, provides the Town of Smoky Lake the opportunity to act as a tourist service centre for trail users.

Major resource extraction and industrial development in Alberta has had a significant impact on the Town of Smoky Lake. While the Town does not currently include major resource extraction or industrial developments, many Town residents work in natural resource extraction industries, or for industries outside of the Town. Although indirect, regional resource extraction and industrial developments are important factors in the Town's social and economic viability.

Environmental Characteristics

The Town of Smoky Lake is located in a shallow valley draining into White Earth Creek, located approximately one kilometre north of the Town boundaries. A tributary creek runs through the northern portion of the community, providing wildlife habitat and low-impact recreational opportunities. Small stands of mixed boreal forest are located along the creek.

Information about the soil capability and local features within the plan area is included in Appendix A for information. This information was analyzed to determine the suitability of future land uses within the plan area.

The majority of undeveloped lands within the plan area are used for agriculture, with some low-lying wet areas and small mixed tree stands.

Existing Land Uses

Within the Town are a variety of planned land uses. Residential development in the Town of Smoky Lake primarily consists of low density, single family dwellings, although several medium density multi-family developments exist in the Town. Residential development adjacent to the town consists of country residential style housing, on acreage-style lots and in association with agricultural operations.

Commercial developments within the Town include downtown shops and services, highway oriented businesses, and large lot developments.

Recreational and community use developments in the Town and the subject area include a wide range of parks (small neighbourhood oriented parks and large multipurpose sport facilities), trail networks (community pathways and the Iron Horse Trail), campgrounds, golf course, schools and churches.

Municipal Services

The Town of Smoky Lake provides full infrastructure services to the majority of the community including storm and sanitary sewer, potable water and garbage collection. The majority of roadways within the Town are developed to an urban standard (paved with sidewalks). Town residents can recycle waste materials at the County transfer stations.

A wide variety of 'soft' services exist within the Town and the subject area, including: provincial government buildings, a hospital (with heli-pad), an auxiliary hospital and lodge, a regional volunteer fire department, multiple recreational facilities, an extensive trail network, schools, churches, a regional library, campgrounds, a golf course, a museum and a regional agricultural society.

2.9 Public Consultation

Public Open House #1

A public open house was held on January 20, 2014 at the Town of Smoky Lake Curling Rink. The purpose of this meeting was to inform local residents and stakeholders about the Town of Smoky Lake + Smoky Lake County Intermunicipal Development Plan project and the Smoky Lake Region regional collaboration initiatives. This meeting was also used to gather local knowledge about past, present and anticipated future development patterns, opportunities and issues in the subject area. Approximately 10 people were in attendance for this meeting.

Public Open House #2

A second public open house was held on June 2, 2015 in the Smoky Lake Curling Club. The purpose of this open house was to review the proposed Intermunicipal Development Plan with the community and stakeholders prior to the formal adoption of the Plan by the Councils of the Town of Smoky Lake and Smoky Lake County.

3 Intermunicipal Growth

3.1 General Land Use Policies

1. Future subdivision and development shall be in accordance with this plan. Major deviations shall require an amendment to this plan. Minor relaxations may be considered without an amendment to this plan where the proponent can demonstrate to the satisfaction of the approving body and the Intermunicipal Planning Committee that the subdivision or development would maintain the intent of the policies contained within this plan.

However, if the Intermunicipal Planning Committee makes a recommendation on a relaxation to this plan to a Council or an approving authority, that Council or authority shall strongly consider such recommendation.

- 2. The partner municipalities agree to work with development proponents and Alberta Transportation and Alberta Environment & Parks to encourage the preparation of area structure plans and/or development concept plans where required by this plan to assure certainty of land use and development standards.
- 3. New applications for confined feeding operations in subject area, or applications for the expansion of any existing confined feeding operations in the subject area, shall not be discouraged due to the proximity of residential areas of the Town.
- 4. The Town and County will work together to provide an adequate inventory of suitable lands to attract a broad range of business and appropriate industry, and will encourage industries that generate large volumes of traffic or substantial traffic loads (in terms of either bulk or weight or potential hazard) to locate in such a manner as to minimize any traffic impact, such as the need for traffic to travel through the Town.
- 5. Subdivision applicants shall dedicate a minimum of 30 metres of environmental reserve, in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Government Act, adjacent to major bodies of water. At the sole discretion of the Subdivision Authority for the affected municipality the amount of environmental reserve required may be varied to accommodate unique site

conditions such as steep slopes, bank instability, or pre-existing development.

- 6. Subdivision applicants will be required to dedicate the full amount of Municipal Reserve owing in the forms provided for in the Municipal Government Act. The Town and County will consider establishing jointlyadministered cash-in-lieu of municipal reserve fund into which reserve proceeds in the subject area would be placed for the purposes of undertaking capital works on regional recreational facilities.
- 7. The Smoky Lake County shall require a Development Concept Plan be prepared and approved prior to the approval of any major development within that portion of the plan area. That Development Concept Plan may be in the form of an Area Structure Plan considered and adopted pursuant to the Municipal Government Act.
- 8. For the purposes of implementing this policy, the definition of the term "major" shall be as agreed upon by the consensus of Town and County staffs, but shall not include development which had been appropriately classified in the municipality's Land Use Bylaw as of the date of the approval of this plan. If they cannot agree, the definition of the term shall be considered and determined by the Intermunicipal Planning Committee.
- 3.2 Agricultural Land Use

The **AGRICULTURAL LAND USE AREA** identifies portions of the plan area that are currently used for agricultural or country residential purposes and lands that may be suitable for future agricultural developments.

The following policies apply to land within the Agricultural Land Use Area:

- The Agricultural Land Use Area shall be those lands within the IDP area identified as Agricultural on Map 5.1 – Future Land Use Concept.
- 2. Agricultural operations in the Plan area are to be protected from encroachment by either competing or conflicting developments resulting from the premature conversion or agricultural land to other land uses.
- 3. Extensive Agriculture will be allowed within the plan area. Intensive agriculture (excluding confined feeding operations) will be allowed, where provided for in the County's Land Use Bylaw. Subdivision and development applications for new intensive agriculture developments and the expansion

of existing intensive agricultural developments will be circulated to the IPC for comments prior to the issuance of a decision by the County's approving (subdivision or development) authority. The IPC will review the application in relation to potential environmental and infrastructure impacts such as: siting of the proposed development in relation to prevailing winds, adjacent land uses, and the impacts on the transportation network.

- 4. Country Residential development may occur within the Agricultural Land Use Area at the discretion of the Subdivision Authority where provided for in the County's Land Use Bylaw.
- Multi-lot Country residential development (more than 5 (five) country residential parcels per quarter section) will only be allowed in the areas designated Serviced and Unserviced Residential on Map 5.1 – Future Land Use Concept.
- 3.3 Residential Land Use

The **FUTURE SERVICED AND UN-SERVICED RESIDENTIAL USE AREA** has been applied to that portion of the plan area that is currently developed or identified for future urban residential and/or country residential development.

Land within the **FUTURE SERVICED AND UN-SERVICED RESIDENTIAL USE AREA** is generally intended for future residential development. For the purposes of this plan urban residential development is generally considered municipally serviced residential development while country residential development is considered residential development that is not serviced by municipal service; specifically, municipal sewer, water, and storm water management systems.

The following policies apply to land within the Future Serviced and Un-Serviced Residential Use area indicated on Map 5.1 – Future Land Use Concept.

- The Future Serviced and Un-Serviced Residential Use areas shall be those lands within the Town of Smoky Lake and Smoky Lake County identified as Future Serviced or Un-Serviced Residential Use on Map 5.1 - Future Land Use Concept.
- 2. Undeveloped land designated for **Serviced or Un-Serviced Residential Use** development shall be buffered from uses that may have negative effects on future urban development by virtue of odour, heat, vibration, visual impact,

noise or light. This does not apply to such effects that arise in the course of normal, non-intensive farm operations.

- 3. Multi-lot residential developments are to be predominantly residential in nature. No developments will be approved either within the residential area or adjacent to the residential which would, in the opinion of the Town or County, negatively impact the Future Serviced or Un-Serviced Residential Area.
- New multi-lot country residential development within the subject area, for the purposes of this plan shall be considered the development of more than 5 (five) lots without municipal piped sewage collection and water supply services within any quarter section, subject to the policies in Section 3.2 of this plan.
- 5. Multi-lot country residential development to create more than (5) five parcels per quarter section shall be allowed only after amendment to the County's Land Use Bylaw, placing the lands where such development may occur into an appropriate Residential District.
- 6. The regulations for residential and accessory development in multi-lot residential and country residential developments shall be provided for in the Smoky Lake County Land Use Bylaw.
- 7. The following policies shall apply to multi-lot residential and country residential development applications and designs:
 - a. internal road access shall be provided to each lot;
 - b. the minimum parcel size for serviced residential lots shall be the minimum lot size indicated in the Town's Land Use Bylaw for residential lots; and
 - c. the minimum parcel size for unserviced country residential lots shall be
 0.4 ha (1.0 acre), and the normal maximum parcel size shall be 1.21 ha
 (3.0 acres); and subdivision proposals shall indicate the location of
 development areas within lots as well as the natural areas on the lots.
- 8. Multi-lot country residential redistricting and subdivision proposals shall address potential conflicts with existing agricultural operations and proposed industrial and commercial operations that may occur on lands

designated for industrial or commercial development, and shall indicate how these potential conflicts will be resolved or mitigated.

- 9. Within the rest of the subject area, the Town and/or County may require a Development Concept Plan or Area Structure Plan be prepared and approved prior to the approval of any amendment to the Land Use Bylaw to allow a multi-lot residential subdivision of more than 5 (five) residential lots within any residential area without municipal piped sewage collection and water supply services within any quarter section.
- 3.4 Commercial Land Use

The SERVICED AND UN-SERVICED COMMERCIAL USE AREAS identify portions of the subject area that are currently developed or identified for future commercial development. The following policies apply to land within Future Serviced and Un-Serviced Commercial Use areas identified on Map 5.1 – Future Land Use Concept.

- The SERVICED AND UN-SERVICED COMMERCIAL USE AREAS shall be those lands within the Town and County identified as Serviced Commercial and Serviced & Un-Serviced Commercial Use on Map 5.1 - Future Land Use Concept.
- 2. Lands designated Serviced Commercial Use may develop in a range of uses which serve local and regional customers, and connects to piped municipal water and sanitary services. These uses include but are not limited to:
 - a. hotels and motels
 - b. food/beverage establishments
 - c. gas bars/service stations
 - d. travel information centres
 - e. car washes
 - f. souvenir shops
 - g. personal service establishments within a hotel/motel
 - h. retail stores with no more than approximately 200 sq. m of retail floor space

- i. vehicle or recreational equipment sales and service
- j. recreational establishments
- k. drive-through businesses
- I. bus depots
- m. bulk fuel storage and distribution
- n. equipment sales, service and rentals
- o. manufactured and modular home sales and service
- p. public or quasi-public uses
- q. surveillance suites
- r. accessory uses or buildings
- 3. Lands designated **Serviced & Un-Serviced Commercial Use** may develop in a range of large lot highway-oriented commercial uses which serve local and regional customers.
- 4. Smoky Lake County may require that a Development Concept Plan or Area Structure Plan be prepared and approved prior to the approval of any amendment to the Land Use Bylaw to allow a substantial commercial development within 1.6 km (1.0 mile) of the boundary of the Town of Smoky Lake.
- 3.5 Industrial Land Use

The SERVICED INDUSTRIAL USE AREA and the UN-SERVICED INDUSTRIAL USE AREA identifies portions of the subject area that are currently developed or identified for future industrial development. The following policies apply to land within the SERVICED INDUSTRIAL USE AREA and the UN-SERVICED INDUSTRIAL USE AREA ON MAP 5.1 – Future Land Use Concept.

 The SERVICED INDUSTRIAL USE AREA and the UN-SERVICED INDUSTRIAL USE AREA shall be those lands within the County identified as SERVICED INDUSTRIAL USE AREA or UN-SERVICED INDUSTRIAL USE AREA on Map 5.1 -Future Land Use Concept.

- 2. Land designated **Serviced Industrial Use** may develop in a wide range of light industrial uses, and will be connected to piped municipal water and sanitary services. Land uses that may be suitable for the area may include but are not limited to:
 - a. natural resource processing industries,
 - b. grain elevators,
 - c. manufacturing, processing, storage, packaging, or assembly of goods or materials, including petroleum products, chemical and associated products, pulp and paper products, fertilizer, or animal by-products,
 - d. warehousing, storage, receiving, or distributing facilities,
 - e. metal processing or fabrication operation or storage,
 - f. agricultural services,
 - g. auctioneering,
 - h. bulk fuel storage and distribution,
 - i. accessory offices,
 - j. commercial greenhouses,
 - k. transportation and public utility facilities/buildings,
 - I. accessory surveillance suites,
 - m. public utilities,
 - n. public or quasi-public uses (e.g., municipal equipment and maintenance yards), and
 - o. accessory uses or buildings,

provided that any nuisance such as odour, noise, glare, vibration, heat, smoke, or effluent is confined to the site of the establishment or within the applicable **Serviced Industrial Use**, or substantially mitigated in accordance with the policies and/or regulations and/or design of a Development Concept Plan or Area Structure Plan, especially in those areas in proximity to existing or proposed residential areas or in proximity to the Town.

In this respect, individual developments will not necessarily be precluded; however, extra precautions shall be required such as requiring a warning system or so-called "disaster plan" should the need arise.

- 3. Land designated **Un-Serviced Industrial Use** may develop in a wide range of light industrial or rural industrial uses, and will utilize onsite water and sanitary systems.
- 4. Smoky Lake County may require a Development Concept Plan or Area Structure Plan be prepared and approved prior to the approval of any amendment to the Land Use Bylaw to allow a substantial rural industrial development within 1.6 km (1.0 mile) of the boundary of the Town of Smoky Lake.
- 5. For the purposes of implementing this policy, the definition of the term "substantial" shall be as agreed upon by the consensus of Town and County staffs. If they cannot agree, the definition of the term shall be considered and determined by the Intermunicipal Planning Committee.
- 3.6 Community Land Use Area

The **COMMUNITY USE AREA** identifies that portion of the subject area that is currently developed for community or recreational uses. It is the intent of this plan that this area continue to be used for community and recreational purposes to provide benefit to both the Town and County. The following policies apply to land within the **COMMUNITY USE AREA on Map 5.1 – Future Land Use Concept**.

- 1. The **COMMUNITY USE AREA** shall be those lands within the Town identified as Future Community Use area on **Map 5.1 Future Land Use Concept**.
- 2. Land designated Future Community Use may develop in a wide range of community uses. Land uses that may be suitable for the area are limited to the permitted and discretionary uses listed in the appropriate land use districts of the Town of Smoky Lake and Smoky Lake County Land Use Bylaws.
- 3. Some residential development may also be permitted in the Community Use Area if the proposed development is consistent with applicable provisions in the Smoky Lake County Land Use Bylaw, federal regulations and provincial regulations.

3.7 Municipal Services and Road Policies

- 1. The Town of Smoky Lake and Smoky Lake County shall establish strategies and standards for the orderly, efficient and economical extension of wastewater collection, water distribution systems, storm water management, and roads within the subject area.
- 2. Some of the development strategies within the subject area are closely connected to the ability and need for municipal piped services.
- 3. Future servicing with municipal piped services may be required within the Future Residential Use area. If such services are not available due to cost or capacity limitations or other reasons, the area shall not be developed for serviced residential purposes unless it meets a minimum agreed residential development standard.
- 4. Where it is deemed appropriate, necessary and/or desirable, further to this plan, the Town and County will endeavor to enter into agreements respecting municipal piped services in the subject area.
- 5. Where proposed developments may impact intersections between Provincial highways and municipal roads, as shown on Map 5.2 Major Intersections, additional consultation with Alberta Transportation will be required prior to approval by the Town and/or County. This consultation may include the preparation of a Traffic Impact Assessment satisfactory to Alberta Transportation. All costs of the TIA and any corresponding intersection improvements will be the responsibility of the developer/proponent.
- 6. The Town and the County will continue to work cooperatively with Alberta Transportation to identify and mitigate traffic impacts and identify the scheduling of necessary improvements at the intersections of highways and municipal roads as shown on Map 5.2 Major Intersections.

3.8 Social Services

Social services within the Plan area are provided by provincial agencies, not-forprofit and volunteer organizations and by the Town, the County and in some instances the Town and the County collaboratively. Currently the following social services are joint Town/County initiatives:

• The Foundation

- Recreation
- Emergency Services
 Ag Society
- 1. The Town and the County will continue to work cooperatively to provide social services to community members within the Smoky Lake region.
- 2. The Town and the County will endeavor to explore opportunities for expanding joint service provisions.

3.9 Emergency Services

Emergency Services within the plan area are provided by the following agencies and organizations:

- RCMP
- Aspen Regional Health
- Smoky Lake Volunteer Fire Department (with fire halls in the Village of Vilna, the Town of Smoky Lake & the Village of Waskatenau)
- 1. The Town and the County will continue to work collaboratively to provide fire and rescue services to the region.
- 3.10 Development Concept Plans & Area Structure Plans
 - 1. A Development Concept Plan or Area Structure Plan may describe, outline, or provide, among other matters, in text and map form:
 - a. a definition of the affected area and a description of the relationship between the affected area and surrounding lands;
 - b. an indication of the proposed land uses and the area of each land use;
 - c. an indication of the total number of dwelling units proposed on the quarter section (if applicable);

- d. policies and plans addressing buffering from adjacent land uses which may be affected by or which may affect a residential community (if applicable);
- e. policies respecting phasing, if any, including an indication of which lots will be developed first and how the development of these lots will be designed specifically to allow for further development of the subject quarter section into residential lots;
- f. policies respecting environmental protection, habitat, ecological conservation, effect on the adjacent agricultural community, including any existing or potential confined feeding operations;
- g. policies and plans addressing natural and man-made limitations to development such as flood susceptibility, bank subsidence, erosion, railway lines, oil and gas wells, pipelines, and other facilities (including active, inactive, abandoned, and decommissioned facilities, sour gas, etc.), gravel operations or resources, airports, agricultural operations, historical resources, other nearby land uses, etc.;
- h. policies respecting built form, amenities, aesthetics, landscaping, architecture, buffering from potential limiting factors, dealing with the potential for land use conflict, etc.;
- i. policies and plans for necessary water supply, sanitary sewage disposal, and storm water management;
- j. as required, policies relating to:
 - i. the impact on adjacent land uses;
 - ii. the impact on community services, such as fire protection;
 - iii. the municipal servicing costs associated with the development, and landscaping; and
 - iv. wetland mitigation.
- a Phase I Environmental Assessment, describing the possibility of contamination within the subject area and, if the Phase I indicates, a Phase II Environmental Assessment, describing the extent of any contamination within the subject area and the means of mitigation;

- I. engineering information in sufficient detail to show how that is to be done;
- m. if the development is to provide water by a municipal piped water supply system, engineering information showing how that is to be done;
- n. if the development is to be supplied with water by means other than a municipal piped water supply system, a report which would satisfy the requirements of Section 23(3)(a) of the Water Act;
- o. an assessment of the general suitability of the Plan area for sewage disposal by tile field (percolation tests);
- p. a determination of any flood plains relating to any water bodies within or adjacent to the subject site, including a description as to how any flood plain lands will be made suitable for development without transferring the flood hazard to other lands;
- q. an assessment of the stability of any banks (either steep slopes or watercourse valleys) within or adjacent to the subject site, including a description as to how any bank stability hazards will be mitigated without transferring the stability hazard to other lands;
- r. A wetland assessment (prepared by a certified wetland professional) that delineates and classifies wetlands (onsite and offsite) that will be impacted by the proposed development.
- s. if within 0.8 km of a Highway, a Traffic Impact Assessment, indicating the vehicular generation from the development at various stages of development, and any roadway improvements that may be necessary on adjacent and nearby roads and Highways (and on their intersections) resulting from that vehicular generation;
- t. an assessment of the site, indicating
 - how Environmental Reserves, Environmental Reserve Easements, Municipal Reserves, and other land management tools are to be used to protect significant biophysical sites;

- ii. how all Provincial and Federal legislation and regulations are to be adhered to respecting wetlands, habitat, and environmentally sensitive lands;
- u. an assessment of all other limitations to development, including potential and actual land use conflicts, which have been identified, indicating how the limitations and conflicts are to be accommodated, dealt with, and/or overcome; and
- v. other policies and plans as may be indicated by the proponent or the municipality to address any unique circumstances of the Development Concept or Area Structure Plan area.
- 2. The level of detail required in a Development Concept Plan or Area Structure Plan shall be as agreed upon by the consensus of Town and County staffs. If they cannot agree, the definition of the term shall be considered and determined by the Intermunicipal Planning Committee.
- 3. The process for considering a Development Concept Plan or Area Structure Plan for approval will be the same as for a major development proposal. The approving authority shall be the Council of the municipality in which the site of the Development Concept Plan or Area Structure Plan is located.

4 Plan Implementation

4.1 Implementation Policies

The Councils of the Town of Smoky Lake and Smoky Lake County have agreed to the following implementation policies which will be used in implementing the policies contained in this plan.

4.2 Plan Amendments

- 1. An amendment to this plan may be proposed by either municipality. An amendment to the plan proposed by a landowner shall be made to the municipality in which the subject land is located.
- 2. An amendment to this plan has no effect unless it is adopted by both municipalities by bylaw.

4.3 Annexation

- 1. There will continue to be a boundary between the Town of Smoky Lake and Smoky Lake County for administration of services such as maintenance of infrastructure, waste management, development control, weed control, etc.
- 2. There is a need for periodic expansion of the urban area, and thus the Town of Smoky Lake, by annexation. Annexations will occur from time to time in a positive, orderly, and timely manner with an agreed-upon process where there is a clear need for Town annexation to provide more land for urban development.
- 3. The Town of Smoky Lake shall demonstrate reasonable need for annexation through appropriate growth studies to support annexation applications.
- 4. Each municipality shall protect lands identified in the plan suitable for municipal piped services from land uses and developments that might unduly interfere with and create conflict with future urbanization.
- 5. Both municipalities shall follow the annexation process as outlined in the Municipal Government Act current at the time an annexation application is made.

4.4 Cost/Revenue Sharing Schemes

- 1. Any agreements for cost and revenue sharing shall be to benefit the future development of land within the plan's subject area.
- 2. The Town and County will explore cost and revenue sharing opportunities as development occurs and through the review and approval process of each Development Concept Plan or Area Structure Plan.

4.5 Framework

- 1. This plan is conceptual. Its policies do not delve into the fine details of land use, servicing, or implementation but instead set out a framework of guidelines for municipal planning policies.
- 2. The Town of Smoky Lake and Smoky Lake County will co-operate in pursuing mutually beneficial economic development initiatives that would attract investment and create employment opportunities in the Smoky Lake Region.
- 3. Map 5.1 Future Land Use Concept of this plan will be the primary land use document supplemented by implementation tools such as Development Concept Plans and Area Structure Plans. The Town of Smoky Lake and Smoky Lake County shall amend their respective Municipal Development Plans and Land Use Bylaws as necessary to be consistent with the policies and provisions of this plan.

4.6 Establishment of the Intermunicipal Planning Committee

- 1. The Intermunicipal Planning Committee (IPC) will be established upon Third Reading of the Bylaws adopting this plan.
- 2. The Intermunicipal Planning Committee will not be a decision-making body, but will submit recommendations to the approving bodies of the respective municipalities, striving for consensus as much as possible.
- 3. The Intermunicipal Planning Committee will be comprised of two (2) members each of the Councils of the Town of Smoky Lake and Smoky Lake County. The ICP will select its own chairman and vice-chairman. The Councils may appoint alternative members, should any member not be able to attend Committee meetings. Additionally, the Chief Administrative Officer or the Development Officer of each municipality shall be ex-officio members of the Committee.

4. The Intermunicipal Planning Committee shall establish its own rules of procedure, including its own schedule of meetings, with meetings being held as required.

4.7 Intermunicipal Planning Committee

- 1. Upon the referral of a matter, the Intermunicipal Planning Committee will schedule a meeting and the administrations of the County and the Town will present their positions on the matter to the Committee.
- 2. After consideration of a matter, the Committee may:
 - a. provide suggestions to both administrations with respect to revisions to the matter that should be considered to make it more acceptable to both municipalities;
 - b. if possible, agree on a consensus position of the Committee in support of or in opposition to the matter, to be presented to both Councils;
 - c. conclude that no initial agreement can be reached and that a consensus position of the Committee will not be presented to both Councils;
 - d. if agreed to by both Municipalities, employ a facilitator to help the Committee work toward a consensus position;
 - e. if a matter cannot be satisfactorily processed following a Committee review, refer the matter to both Councils; or undertake any other action it deems reasonable.
- 3. The Intermunicipal Planning Committee shall not deal with all development matters within the Town of Smoky Lake + Smoky Lake County Intermunicipal Development Plan subject area. Rather, it will deal with all matters referred to it in the manner described in **Section 4.7** of this plan.
- 4. The Intermunicipal Planning Committee has the following functions:
 - a. to clarify the intent and interpretation of the plan;
 - b. to develop specific strategies related to the provision of infrastructure, service provision, cost sharing, etc. for proposed subdivision and development in the subject area that reflect the policies and guidelines set out in this plan;

- c. to review and comment on applications to amend this plan;
- d. to review and comment on development matters referred to it in accordance with this plan; and
- e. to undertake such other matters as it deems reasonable and as are referred to it by either Council or municipal administration.
- 5. The Town of Smoky Lake and Smoky Lake County agree that the County's Subdivision Authority and Development Authority will notify the Intermunicipal Planning Committee of applications received within subject area and that the Town's Subdivision Authority and Development Authority will notify the Intermunicipal Planning Committee of applications within the subject area.
- 6. Each municipality's Subdivision Authority and Development Authority will deal with an application within their own boundaries in accordance with the policies of this plan.
- 7. Depending on the nature of the proposed subdivision or development, the Intermunicipal Planning Committee may provide recommendations related to the proposed development or subdivision.
- 4.8 Dispute Resolution/Mediation Procedures
 - 1. The dispute resolution process for matters related to this plan is outlined in this section. The emphasis of the dispute resolution process is mediation at the municipal level prior to an appeal to the Municipal Government Board. This process is based on an assumption that the two parties may have significant differences of opinion on any particular matter and that third-party assistance may be necessary to help resolve the disputes.
 - 2. For the purposes of this plan, a dispute is defined as a disagreement between the Town of Smoky Lake and Smoky Lake County on any statutory plan, any Land Use Bylaw, or any amendment to any statutory plan or Land Use Bylaw which is given First Reading by a Council, or any subdivision or development permit application, or any scheme for the provision of municipal services, which the other municipality deems may be inconsistent with the goals, objectives, and policies of this plan.
 - 3. Decisions on all disputes will be made by the respective municipalities in accordance with the provisions of this plan and the Municipal Government Act, but with review as indicated in **Section 4.7.5** of this plan.

- 4. The Town of Smoky Lake and Smoky Lake County agree to consider the establishment of an Intermunicipal Subdivision and Development Appeal Board to deal with appeals arising from subdivision or development permit decisions within the subject area.
- 5. Disputes shall be addressed and shall be resolved through any of the following mechanisms either singularly or in combination with each other:
 - a. Administrative Review
 - b. Intermunicipal Planning Committee
 - c. Municipal Councils
 - d. Mediation
 - e. Non-binding Arbitration
 - f. Appeal Process Intermunicipal Dispute or Subdivision and Development Appeal Board
 - g. Court Option
- 6. In the event of a dispute, the applicant municipality will not give approval to the matter in any way (e.g., development permit or subdivision approval, or Second or Third Reading of a bylaw) until the dispute is past the mediation stage.
- 7. The time limitations and legislative requirements as may be specified from time to time in the Municipal Government Act will be respected in relation to the administration of this dispute resolution procedure and may supersede the time processes provided for in this plan.

4.9 Administrative Review

 The municipality within which any development, subdivision, land use bylaw amendment, servicing scheme, or other matter is proposed (hereinafter referred to as "the applicant municipality") will provide complete information concerning the matter to both the other municipality and to the Intermunicipal Planning Committee. The other municipality (hereinafter referred to as "the responding municipality") will undertake an evaluation of the matter and provide comments to the administration of the applicant municipality.

- 2. If there is any concern, the two administrations shall discuss the issue and attempt to resolve the matter.
- 3. If the administrations resolve the concern, the responding municipality will formally notify the applicant municipality and the Intermunicipal Planning Committee, and the applicant municipality will take the appropriate actions to consider approving the matter.
- 4. In the event that the issue is not resolved at the administrative level, the applicant municipality's administration shall refer the matter to the Intermunicipal Planning Committee.
- 5. Upon the referral of a matter, the Intermunicipal Planning Committee will schedule a meeting and the administrations of the Town and County will present their positions on the matter to the Committee.
- 6. After consideration of a matter, the Committee may:
 - a. provide suggestions to both administrations with respect to revisions to the matter that should be considered to make it more acceptable to both municipalities;
 - b. if possible, agree on a consensus position of the Committee in support of or in opposition to the matter, to be presented to both Councils;
 - c. conclude that no initial agreement can be reached and that a consensus position of the Committee will not be presented to both Councils;
 - d. if agreed to by both Municipalities, employ a facilitator to help the Committee work toward a consensus position;
 - e. if a matter cannot be satisfactorily processed following a Committee review, refer the matter to both Councils; or
 - f. undertake any other action it deems reasonable.
- 4.10 Municipal Councils
 - 1. After receiving the recommendations of the Intermunicipal Planning Committee with respect to a particular matter, each Council will establish a position on the matter.

- 2. If both municipal Councils are in agreement on a matter, then the consideration of approval (including, if necessary, an amendment process) can be completed. If neither Council supports the matter, then no further action will be undertaken.
- 3. If the Councils cannot agree on a matter, then the matter may be referred to a mediation process.
- 4. In the event that the matter goes to mediation, the applicant municipality will not give any approval to the matter until mediation has been pursued.

4.11 Mediation

- 1. The following will be required before a mediation process can proceed:
 - a. agreement by both Councils that mediation is necessary;
 - b. appointment by both Councils of an equal number of elected officials to participate in a mediation process;
 - c. engagement, at equal cost to both municipalities, of an impartial an independent mediator agreed to by both municipalities; and
 - d. approval by both municipalities of a mediation schedule, including the time and location of meetings and a deadline for the completion of the mediation process.
- 2. If agreed to by both municipalities, any members of the Intermunicipal Planning Committee or administrative staff from either municipality who are not participating directly in the mediation process may act as information resources either directly or indirectly to the mediation process.
- 3. All participants in the mediation process will be required to keep details of the mediation confidential until the conclusion of the mediation.
- 4. At the conclusion of the mediation, the mediator will submit a mediator's report to both Councils.
- 5. If a mediated agreement is reached, then that agreement will be referred to both Councils for action. Both Councils will consider the mediator's report and the respective positions of the municipal administrations with respect to the mediated agreement. Any mediated agreement will not be binding on either municipality and will be subject to the formal approval of both Councils.

- 6. If no mediated agreement can be reached or if both Councils do not approve a mediated agreement, then a non-binding arbitration process as described below may be initiated.
- 4.12 Non-Binding Arbitration
 - 1. The following will be required before a non-binding arbitration process can proceed:
 - a. agreement by both Councils that non-binding arbitration is necessary;
 - b. appointment by both Councils of officials to participate in the nonbinding arbitration process;
 - c. engagement, at equal cost to both municipalities, of an impartial and independent arbitrator agreed to by both municipalities; and
 - d. approval by both municipalities of an arbitration schedule, including the time and location of meetings and a deadline for the completion of the process.
 - 2. At the conclusion of the non-binding arbitration, the arbitrator will submit a report to both Councils.
 - 3. If both Councils agree, then the arbitrator's recommendations will be implemented by the Council or Councils as necessary. Any arbitrator's decision will not be binding on either municipality unless both municipalities concur, and will be subject to the formal approval of both Councils.
 - 4. If no agreement can be reached to abide by the arbitrator's decision or if both Councils do not approve the arbitrator's recommendation, then an appeal process may be initiated if provided for under the provisions of the Municipal Government Act. If there is no appeal process available, then the applicant municipality may proceed with any approvals as are allowed.
- 4.13 Appeal Process Intermunicipal Dispute or Subdivision and Development Appeal Board
 - 1. In the event that the mediation process fails, the applicant municipality may approve the matter (e.g., a Land Use Bylaw amendment, a development permit approval, etc.).


- 2. If the applicant municipality passes a bylaw to implement the matter, then the responding municipality may appeal that action to the Municipal Government Board under the provisions of Section 690 of the Municipal Government Act in accordance with that Act.
- 3. If the appeal of the matter is to the applicant municipality's Subdivision and Development Appeal Board, the responding municipality may appeal that action to the Subdivision and Development Appeal Board as it sees fit.
- 4. If there is no appeal available pursuant to the Act, then the responding municipality may wish to pursue a Court option.

4.14 Court Option

- 1. After any action by the Municipal Government Board, or the applicant municipality's Council or Subdivision and Development Appeal Board from which there is no further appeal, the responding municipality will have the option, should it so choose, of undertaking a court challenge of the matter.
- 4.15 Intermunicipal Development Plan Termination
 - 1. The plan is renewable by resolution of both Councils before the 5th anniversary of the third reading of the Bylaws adopting this plan and every 5 years thereafter. Failure to renew this plan by both municipalities by the 5th anniversary will cause the plan to lapse and cease to exist.







Town of Smoky Lake + Smoky Lake County IDP Map 5.2 - Major Intersections



INTRODUCTION

Project Context

During the winter & spring of 2021, Smoky Lake County has been exploring possibilities of changes to the Land Use Bylaw dealing with several areas:

- 1) Potentially allowing the keeping of chickens in hamlets.
- 2) How to better address management of Recreational Vehicles (RVs) at Lake Lots.
- 3) Pursuing Dark Sky designation.

Rather than proceed directly to making bylaw amendments, County Council decided to engage the public for input and considerations in these three areas.

During the months of June/July 2021, an Open House and Survey series was conducted, the results of which this report summarizes for Council's consideration.


RVs at Lake Lots - Survey Results

Reply rate: Open House July 14




Do you live or visit/own property at a Smoky Lake County lake?


Do you personally have one or more RVs at a lake lot, either on a permanent or visiting basis


How many RVs do you keep or visit at your lake lot?




Should the number of RVs allowed permanently on a lake lot take into consideration the lot size? i.e., larger lot could allow for more RVs?

- Current rules seem ok
- I believe that people wanting to invite their family and friends to their lake lot should be encouraged. Areas that are quick to have unreasonable rules and fast to hand out tickets get reputations for areas not to visit.
- Issue a warning before ticketing.
- Additional trailers (unlimited amount) should only be allowed on long weekends. An easy bylaw to impart and even easier to enforce. Any additional r.v.'s other than a long weekend would get ticketed. Encourage the use of the campground across the lake. Insure there is adequate parking on the lot to accomodate extra units, atv's and vehicles. What ever is decided it has to be easy to understand and even easier to enforce.
- Bylaw checks and assessments aren't happening now and should be a top priority. Ticketing should also be more effectively applied for offenders.
- *Ppl own the land so as long as it's tide and not an eye sore, let the families be. We are land owners at Bonnie lake and we love the amount of kids that come with these campers. It's good for the community to have young families spending there money in the smoky lake area.*
- The amount of days for a permitted RV dhoujd be extended to one week. Many friends & relatives take vacation time in one week increments.
- Enforce the current bylaw.
- Mons Lake, more specifically Sandy Lane sun-division is a RV sun-division. There's isn't a problem now, so why regulate something that's not a problem? I think it's great that family and friend can enjoy all Smoky County has to offer, and limiting RV's does not make sense. Smoky Lake has camp sites. The density of RVs is much greater than any lake lot, and there is no issue...so why should there be restrictions on parcels 1-2 acre as in size? Makes no sense! If someone is complaining that is a permanent residence then they should have taken into consideration they are living in a RV sun-division.
- I believe that restricting numbers of RV's on privately owned properties & lake lots is Deplorable. Many families are large in numbers. We all also have family & friends who we enjoy camping with & partaking in recreational, fun times together. Being fortunate to own recreational property where our family & friends can gather to share our day to day lives, relax, & restore our mental health enjoying time & fun while not outwardly disturbing others. Most times these neighborhoods become great friends & communities that support each other, enjoying weekends & all year long fun & relaxation!!
- If the site is clean and maintained then let the owners manage their own lake lots and visitors.
- *4 days is not enough time for additional RV's. If people take a week or two vacation they cannot come stay on larger lots*

- County should be enforce stricter regulation
- We live at Mons Lake who cares how many RVs are on THEIR lot they pay tax's it's ridiculous this bylaw is STUPID leave them a lone
- As long as the property is kept up and the trailers are in proper condition, I don't have an issue with a lacre lot or larger having 3 or 4
- Larger lot sizes should be able to host more campers. Long term campers should be in reasonably good condition and not a site for sore eyes to be a friendly neighbor
- Not everyone that owns a lakelot is wealthy. Some of us choose it as a lifestyle and put our money towards that instead of other things. cabins are expensive to maintain and need year round care. I have 1 trailer for for my husband and I and one for the my young adult children. Why should i not be able to have friends come visit with their trailer for more than 4 days? I have owned 1/2 acre lot for 18 years, paid taxes for 18 years. I think this is not a fair rule. Maybe no longer than 1 week seems more appropriate. I don't understand why this is an issue, maybe i'm missing something I don't know. Regulation means discouragement to have guests.
- Anything.g over 1 acre in size should be aloud 4 permanent rv trailers in lot at all times. Friends come from out of province at times and for more then 4 days at a time. More then should be aloud for a minimum of 2 weeks at a time
- Some lots can definitely host more trailers than others. If the lot size is larger than 1 acre I think 4 long term trailers should be allowed as typically families want to leave the trailers and not have to pack up each weekend or decide who cannot leave their trailers on site. Also, 4 day duration for other visitors is sometimes not long enough if guests want to stay for a whole week.
- Enforce this bylaw
- Some yards/acreages are looking more like a junk yard because of all the rv's, cars, trucks parked in them.
- Visiting rv's for 7 days.
- Currently there is no enforcement of the 2 trailers per lot. The lot owners should be fined or have the extra trailers removed from their lots. Some lots have up to 4/5 trailers on their site permanently, and no the extra trailers are not visiting for 4 days. The Mons Lake resort area is looking like a campground mixed with permanent residents in their houses or cabins. The county is not getting their fair share of property taxes on these mini campgrounds versus the residents who have put a significant investment in their properties which increases the property tax base for the campground. These mini campgrounds have an effect on the residual property values of permanent residents.
- The county should allow any number of visiting rvs during the summer (May to Sept). Then only allow the two permanent rvs to remain the rest of the year
- Charge a \$250 per year fee for the third trailer anaully to help increase operating budgets for the county

- Some of these properties are an acre or more and your saying there can only be two trailers on an acre of land??? Doesn't make sense. The County should not be regulating the privately owned property. As in the current bylaws, they are calling owned land as campsites/campground, this isn't right. Privately owned property, in which the owner pays taxes, are not campsites. The public campground by the lake consists of campsites which make up a campground and should be the only property along with any other public property is the only property which should be regulated under the campground/campsite bylaws. Another thing that should be taken into consideration is that not all owners have a cabin on their property, They leave their RV on the property year round and it is never pulled. Therefore, it should not be included in the limit of two rv's.
- If there is a concern at a particular development, visit the lot owners, assess the site. I want to leave our trailer(s) on our lot over the winter, do not see the need for restriction on number. I am curious if there has been an increase in complaints, what is the reasoning for reviewing this bylaw?
- *4 days is not enough time for summer camping lot size should be taken into consideration on how many and how long*
- No, everything is fine the way it is
- Make all lakelot owners aware of regulations(including when transfer of ownership occurs)Unless people have to be accountable there is no reason for them to follow rules. Lakelot owners need to consider the maintenance of a healthy lake requires all to be involved.
- Smoky lake county currently does not allow a guest/bunk house suite (grandma/grandpa suite). If the county allowed a guests suite with rules I believe the amount of trailers would be decreased.
- number of vehicles at the rv lot so does not interfere with the arrival of other campers
- *I have 2 permanent rv's. If I have family visit for 5 days getting a permit is ridiculous and they aren't staying for the entire season*
- If the rules were to change and we were not allowed two permanent trailers we would definitely reconsider owning in Smokey lake county.
- We have been landowners at Birchland Resort since 1976. We pay significant taxes on our permanent home each year. It is our understanding that while there are taxes paid on land, there are no taxes paid on RV's. Consequently by allowing multiple RV's on one lot multiple families are using the same benefits that we pay a significant tax for. Allowing multiple RV's on a single lot increases the pollution in the development, increases the wear and tear on the roads, increases the boat traffic on Garner Lake, increases the amount of refuse put in the landfill etc. The County needs to restrict the number of permanent RV's to one per lot while allowing one temporary RV for 4 days. Alternatively the County needs to implement an RV tax or a significant RV annual licence fee to make the land use bylaw equitable for permanent homeowners.

- Lot sizes vary largely in the county, I believe having a 2 RV limit is not a great unit of measure for the various sizes of properties. I believe there needs to be regulations to ensure people are not disrupting or hindering the peace of others however, the same limit for all properties is not a fair justification. Please consider amending this bylaw to ensure it is fair for all property owners.
- No, I feel that if people own their lots they should be able to have family or friends visit whenever they please for as long as they please.
- Follow up on offenders has not currently been done according to our bylaws
- Enforcement needs to be cost effective and a program not be so regulated and monitored that significant tax payer dollars are spent on this issue. Permits if allowed should be affordable.
- If the RV's are connected to water, power and sanitation then they can stay year-round.
- On a subdivision of 111 lots if you permitted 3 or more units on a lot then it could increase the overall population. This would create havoc exta usage at the beach lake facitities. Extra garbage. The County does not get any extra taxes for the extra units.
- Encourage people to be friendly and address it with their neighbours, rather than enforce it as a "bylaw" for people to find something to complain about.
- There needs to be standards set dictating the condition and appearance of the trailer. I think so long as the property owners is hosting their guests in a tasteful manner, it shouldn't be much concern for surrounding properties.
- Issue permits
- *Minimum setback from lot line requirement. Existing bylaw is adequate. Do you have manpower to enforce this all summer?*
- Permanent RVs need to be in compliance with environmental regulations. For example the County must have unannounced inspections for RVs dumping their sewer in the bush. The County must inspect each permanent trailer for a septic tank and receipts for it being emptied. It's ridiculous that the County Councillors tell me I should enter someomes lot and take a photo to report them. You want me to get into a confrontation? For 3 trailers to fit on a lot there usually is no room for natural bush retention- just "destroy all the trees" and make a gravel parking lot. Garner Lake cannot environmentally handle being a Prov. Park and having 3 trailers on a lot over-taxing the lake and the trails. Smoky Lake County should be embarassed for turning Garner Lake into a slough, but without birds. Why would anyone consider investing in building a cabin or buying one when a drive through on Birchland Drive is a trailer park with 3 RVs plus shippinf containers on every street? Permanent RVs must not be allowed to put Containers on their property. it's just trailer park county development. Once a permanent RV puts on a deck it must now be classified as a cabin and have to pay a fixed tax as a cabin. It is ridiculous that Smoky Lake Council have turned Birchland Drive into a trailer park Look at all the cabin's for sale. People want out of a trsiler park which under original Caveats they did not buy into.

- If your own land and it's taken care of, leave the owners alone
- fines and enforcement for trespassers
- Do sweeps on weekends and enforce the land use bylaw when there are noisy camps of numerous RVs, particularly beyond the edge of the property in ditches and on roadways.
- Signs at boat launch for no swimmers or people sitting and fishing off dock as it really slows loading/unloading boats and not safe for anyone
- Farm owner at Hanmore lake has three cabins and as much as 8 travel trailers on his property, creating loads traffic, dust, also I'm concerned about sewage as these trailers never leave the lots.

- Safety swimming rope marking at both sides of the lake so people safely know where to swim out to.
- The boat Lau ch needs a second dock installed over by the playground with a roped off swimming area . - Allowing a secondary suite (grandparents suite) when a dwelling already exists would be great, even if restricted size was needed and would limit the number of RVs needed.






Are you aware that under the current Smoky Lake County Land Use Bylaw, it is not possible to keep chickens in a hamlet?





Are you aware that many other rural and urban communities allow for residents to keep chickens in a residential environment, such as the Cities of Edmonton, and Strathcona County?







Should residents of county hamlets be permitted to keep a limited number of chickens?






Do you personally enjoy the fantastically dark skies in Smoky Lake County?




Are you aware of the positive significance of dark skies for personal health and wellbeing, tourism, energy efficiency, and the natural environment?





- There's actually very few downsides to allowing 'urban' chickens, and there really shouldn't be any issues passing this bylaw change.




CONCLUSION

Good afternoon,

Smoky Lake County has undertaken a collaborative initiative to see 718 kilometers of the North Saskatchewan River across Alberta (from the Banff National Park boundary to the border with the Province of Saskatchewan) designated as a Canadian Heritage River under the <u>Canadian Heritage Rivers System (CHRS)</u>. This honorary designation celebrates the cultural, natural, and recreational values of exceptional Canadian rivers from coast-to-coast-to-coast. Specifically, we have commenced this project in-part, to:

- Heighten pride, stewardship, education, awareness, and placemaking.
- Strengthen and improved relations with Indigenous communities.
- Support tourism recovery and development across the province.

Already, we have secured support from 15 river-adjacent municipalities, the Metis Nation of Alberta (MNA), the Confederacy of Treaty 6 First Nations, Explore Edmonton, Fort Edmonton, Paddle Alberta, Travel Alberta, Indigenous Tourism Alberta, and EPCOR, among others.

The designation is designed to supports and generate awareness, conversation, collaboration, and education among river partners, residents, and users to the cultural, natural, and recreational values of the North Saskatchewan River. It is strictly commemorative in nature, meaning it does not change any jurisdiction, ownership, or traditional rights existing on the river today nor does it add any additional regulatory or approvals by other authorities for applications along the river.

This initiative is also timely, especially considering other work being undertaken by other organizations and communities along the river, such as:

- North Saskatchewan Watershed Alliance (NSWA) Riparian Web Portal and WaterSHED Monitoring Program
- Province of Alberta North Saskatchewan Surface Water Quality Framework
- Smoky Lake County, Strathcona County, and Parkland County Tourism Strategies
- Travel Alberta Bootstrap Recovery Strategy (2021-2024)

- Indigenous Tourism Alberta Projects
- Explore Edmonton 10-year Tourism Master Plan (Including Strategy 3)
- City of Edmonton River Valley Planning Modernization Project (2021-2022)

We are writing to inform you of a potential opportunity for municipal councils to meet with the Honourable Ric McIver, Minister of Municipal Affairs, at the 2021 RMA Fall Convention, scheduled for November 23-26, 2021. It is our hope that these meetings will be in person. We understand there may be newly elected officials on council and the meeting requirements may change following the municipal elections. However, should your municipality wish to meet with Minister McIver during the convention, please submit a request by email to MA.MSLEngagementGroup@gov.ab.ca no later than September 10, 2021.

In your meeting request, please be sure to include two specific policy items or issues your municipality would like to discuss with the Minister.

We generally receive more requests to meet with the Minister than can be reasonably accommodated over the course of the convention. To ensure suitable consideration of requests, municipalities should be mindful of the following criteria:

- Policy items or issues directly relevant to the Minister of Municipal Affairs and the department will be given priority.
- Municipalities located within the Capital Region can be more easily accommodated throughout the year, so priority will be given to requests from municipalities at a distance from Edmonton and to municipalities with which Minister McIver has not yet had an opportunity to meet.
- Meeting requests received after the deadline will not be considered for the convention, but may be considered for future meeting opportunities.

Meeting times with the Minister are scheduled for approximately 20 minutes per municipality. This will allow the Minister the opportunity to engage with as many municipal councils as possible. All municipalities submitting meeting requests will be notified at least two weeks prior to the convention as to the status of their request.

Municipal Affairs will make every effort to find alternative opportunities throughout the remainder of the year for those municipalities the Minister is unable to accommodate during the convention.

Thank you for your letter of May 31, 2021, regarding the Government of Alberta's commitment to conduct a detailed study into the costs, benefits, and structure of a potential Alberta provincial police service. I appreciate the opportunity to provide the following information.

The Fair Deal Panel consulted with tens of thousands of Albertans and heard about many rural Albertans' frustrations with the RCMP and additionally, consulted with policy experts and undertook research to inform its recommendations. As indicated in the Fair Deal Panel's report, that although many Albertans express their appreciation and respect for the work of hardworking rank and file members in the RCMP who serve our communities, many Albertans are also frustrated with the challenges of a police force that is ultimately managed in Ottawa.

The Government of Alberta has an obligation to listen to the concerns of its citizens, undertake a thorough study of the topic, and make an informed decision on whether an Alberta provincial police service can improve the safety and security of Albertans and their property. Justice and Solicitor General, along with its project contractor PricewaterhouseCoopers (PwC), has concluded a feasibility study on the costs, benefits, and structure of a potential Alberta provincial police service. Through this study, we also have a responsibility to see if there are new approaches to provincial policing that can provide greater value for taxpayers, while strengthening the connection between police and the communities they serve.

Police have an essential role in protecting our communities – which is why we will ensure police funding is used to keep Albertans safe. As part of the study, PwC has been asked to develop a model of provincial policing that increases citizen input, enhances connections to the community, improves services, leverages efficiencies, reduces bureaucracy, and does not impose additional costs on municipalities.

PwC delivered their report to the provincial government on April 30, 2021. The Government of Alberta is currently reviewing the report. If the Alberta government decides to proceed with further analysis, Justice and Solicitor General will conduct further study and engagement, which will include local policing perspectives from municipal partners.

Thank you again, for taking the time to write. I look forward to working with you further as we ensure all Albertans feel safe, secure, and protected in their communities.

MEMORANDUM OF AGREEMENT made as of the _____ of _____, 2021

BETWEEN:

HER MAJESTY THE QUEEN, in right of Alberta, as represented by Alberta Transportation ("Alberta")

-and-

Smoky Lake County

in the Province of Alberta (the "Municipality")

The Municipality has proposed to undertake Emergency Bridge Repairs of **BF#09915** (in this document referred to as the "Project"); and

Ownership of the said BF#09915 is vested in the Crown in right of Alberta; and

Under the provision of Alberta Regulation 79/2003, the Minister may enter into an agreement with respect to any matter relating to the payment of a grant; and

The Minister, as a condition to the use of Provincial funds for the construction of the **BF#09915**, under the Strategic Transportation Infrastructure Program – Local Road **Bridge Component**, deems it necessary to enter into an agreement with the Municipality to ensure the preservation and protection of **BF#09915** as an efficient means of transportation.

In consideration of the terms and conditions specified in this document, the parties agree as follows:

- 1. The Municipality shall undertake the **Emergency Bridge Repairs** of **BF#09915** in accordance with the detailed plan and specifications as approved by the Minister.
- 2. The maximum contribution by the Minister shall be limited to **One Hundred Seventy Two Thousand** dollars (**\$172,000**) or Seventy-Five Percent (75%) of the actual shareable costs, whichever is less, as shown in the **Schedule of Costs**, in this document referred to as the **"Schedule A"**, attached to this document and forming part of this Agreement.
- 3. The Minister may advance a portion or all of the funds specified in Clause 2 in trust or provide payments upon submission of invoices submitted by the municipality based on actual expenditures incurred on the project.

- 4. Nothing in this Agreement will preclude the Municipality from using other sources of funding to complete the work agreed upon.
- 5. The Municipality will accept the funds granted conditionally by the Minister on the following terms and conditions:
 - a) the Municipality shall maintain a separate accounting for costs incurred on the project and all funds granted conditionally by the Minister;
 - b) the Municipality will ensure expenditures accounted for against the principal amount of any advance and the interest earned is only for the work accepted by the Minister under this Agreement;
 - c) any interest earned on the provincial funds held by the Municipality will only be applied to the total eligible project expenditures so as to reduce the total sharable cost; and
 - d) **"Interest Earned"** shall be calculated based on the actual interest earned by the municipality so as to maximize the interest on such money, subject to provisions of the Municipal Government Act or a method agreeable to the Minister;
 - e) all funds advanced conditionally and accumulated interest not expended prior to December 31st in any year, will be retained conditionally by the Municipality and expended on the Project in the following year(s). The Municipality agrees that any funds and accrued interest unexpended on completion or termination of the Project will be returned to the Province or may be treated as an advance on other Transportation programs as may be specified by the Minister.
- 6. The Municipality agrees that the Minister shall have the right at all times to inspect the cost records of the Municipality, the work specified in this document, and any and all materials supplied or used in connection with this work, and shall have the right to require any modification or alteration in the work to ensure its completion in accordance with the specifications forming part of this Agreement.
- 7. The Municipality agrees that:
 - a) it will utilize competent engineering consultants registered and licensed to practice in the Province of Alberta, in this document referred to as the "Engineer", for the design including preparation of the plans and specifications and for the quality control activities and supervision of the contract during construction; and



- b) it will undertake the construction on a contract basis, and shall invite tenders; and where the Municipality recommends that any tender other than the low tender be accepted, shall submit to the Province for its written approval its recommendation respecting such awarding, together with details of all tenders received; and
- c) it will ensure that the accepted work is carried out in accordance with the rules, regulations and laws governing such works and in accordance with the best general practice, and in a manner agreeable to the Minister; and
- d) it will satisfy itself that the costs proposed and submitted by the Engineer for their services are considered fair and reasonable; and
- e) it will provide the Minister with confirmation of construction completion; and a certified financial statement of all costs incurred; and revenues received with respect to the project; along with copies of all relevant invoices; and
- f) it will schedule the work to be completed by March 30, 2024.
- 8. Upon completion of the work, the Municipality shall allow free and complete use of the said **BF#09915** to and by any lawfully licensed vehicle operated in accordance with the Traffic Safety Act.
- 9. The Municipality agrees that it shall at its own expense perform subsequent maintenance on the **BF#09915** including upkeep of signage and pavement markings, as required.
- 10. The Municipality shall indemnify and hold harmless the Minister, his employees and agents from any and all claims, demands, actions and costs or whatever may arise, directly or indirectly, out of any act or omission of the Municipality, its employees or agents, in the performance by the Municipality of this Agreement. Such indemnification shall survive termination of this Agreement.
- 11. The parties agree to give this Agreement a fair and liberal interpretation and to negotiate with fairness and candor, any modification or alteration that may be rendered necessary by changing conditions.

I am pleased to confirm that Alberta will receive \$499 million in funding under the federal Gas Tax Fund (GTF) in 2021. This includes an additional one-time payment of \$244 million announced by Canada in March 2021 in recognition of the critical role our communities play in a safe restart, and to help reduce the risk of infrastructure projects being delayed or cancelled. This additional funding is intended to help municipalities and Metis Settlements address local infrastructure needs, and must follow all rules and conditions of the GTF program.

For Smoky Lake County:

• The **2021 GTF allocation is \$288,156**. This includes \$140,800 as a result of the one-time funding top-up.

GTF funding amounts for all municipalities and Metis Settlements are also posted on the Government of Alberta website at <u>open.alberta.ca/publications</u>.

In addition, the federal government announced that the GTF program is being renamed to the Canada Community-Building Fund to better reflect the nature of the program. Over the coming months, Municipal Affairs will be updating program documents, websites, and IT systems to reflect this change.

This letter is to inform you of a project construction delay for the Metis Crossing Solar Project (MCSP) being developed by the Metis Nation of Alberta (MNA).

IBI Group, formerly Peters Energy Solutions Inc., on behalf of the Metis Nation of Alberta, will be submitting a time extension application to the AUC for this project due to unforeseen funding delays. The AUC Proceeding 25634 was approved on September 9, 2020, and had an anticipated construction start date of August 2021 and competition scheduled for April 2022. We now anticipate the project construction to start in October 2021 and be complete by November 2022.

The other details of the project are not changing. The power plant shall consist of 15,156 solar photovoltaic panels, with a total generating capability of 4.86 MW, situated on approximately 30 acres of land in the north half of Section 9, Township 58, Range 17, West of the Fourth Meridian, on land owned by MNA in the municipal district of Smoky Lake County. The project involves installing PV panels, panel racking and mounting systems, several transformer inverter stations, an electrical collection system and interconnection infrastructure required to connect to the Alberta Interconnected Electric System (AIES).

Dear Members of the Heritage Rivers Board,

As an Independent Senator from Alberta, as a member of the Senate Standing Committee on Energy, the Environment, and Natural resources, and as a born-and-bred Edmontonian, I'm writing to you in support of the application to have the North Saskatchewan River declared a national heritage river.

I grew up on the banks of the North Saskatchewan River valley. The river has helped to define my life. And it has helped to define my city and my province. I believe the river is a natural candidate for this designation. In the first place, it is an important environmental legacy. Because it has been relatively untouched by industrial development, or heavy transportation, it remains for much of its length a healthy riparian ecosystem. Clean-up efforts over the last decades have seen a return of many of the fish species that historically populate the river. The valley itself is an essential wildlife corridor that connects Banff National Park to the environs of Elk Island National Park. And of course the river is the source of fresh drinking water for many communities large and small all along its banks.

Secondly, it is a much-storied river with a rich multicultural heritage. The Cree called it kisisikâciwanisîpiy, the swiftly flowing river. For the Blackfoot, it was omaka-ty, the big river. For centuries the river sustained the First Nations as a source of water and food and as a corridor that made trade connections. Later, it brought the fur traders west to Edmonton and carried their furs back to Hudson Bay for shipment to Europe. It was the river that brought French-Canadians voyageurs, labourers from the Orkney Islands, and even Alberta's first black resident (a Hudson's Bay Company navigator) who arrived via canoe in 1799. It was the river that helped to give birth to Alberta's Metis Nation, and this river carried the poetic Earl of Southesk west in 1859 to visit Fort Edmonton as the first celebrity tourist. It was the river that brought many of the first settlers to northern Alberta long before the railway arrived, whether they were from Lebanon or Ukraine or Norway. It was the riverside where people farmed or built their mines and brickyards. That history deserves to be recognized and celebrated, not just locally but as part of the Canadian story.

On October 18, 2021, the Government of Alberta intends to conduct a provincewide election of nominees for Canada's Senate, as well as a referendum. Senate and referendum voting will be conducted alongside the general municipal election. To support local governments administering these votes, the Senate Election Grants Regulation under the *Alberta Senate Election Act* and Referendum Payments Regulation under the *Referendum Act* require the Minister of Municipal Affairs to make payments to the local authorities that are administering the votes.

The regulations state:

- where an election under the Local Authorities Election Act is required in a municipality or ward, the elected authority or other body that conducts the vote under the Alberta Senate Election Act or Referendum Act in that municipality or ward shall be paid a grant of \$1 per capita or \$1,000, whichever is greater; or
- where no election under the *Local Authorities Election Act* is required in a municipality or ward, the elected authority or other body that conducts the vote under the *Alberta Senate Election Act* or *Referendum Act* in that municipality or ward shall be paid \$2 per capita or \$2,000, whichever is greater.

Given there will be both senate elections and referendum questions occurring as part of the 2021 municipal general election, municipalities holding local elections will be eligible for a grant of \$1 per capita or \$1,000 (whichever is greater) for the senate election vote and \$1 per capita or \$1,000 (whichever is greater) for the referendum for a total interim grant of \$2 per capita or \$2,000 (whichever is greater).

Should it then later be determined that a municipality does not need to hold a local election, the municipality will then be eligible for an additional grant of \$1 per capita or \$1,000 (whichever is greater) for the senate election vote and \$1 per capita or \$1,000 (whichever is greater) for the referendum for a total combined grant of \$4 per capita or \$4,000 (whichever is greater).

Based on this formula, and to streamline the process, **Smoky Lake County** will receive an initial grant payment of **\$4,922** in August to conduct the 2021 Senate election and referendum. If a local election is not held under the *Local Authorities Election Act* in **Smoky Lake County** on October 18, a second payment of **\$4,922** will be made in October.

If the Senate election and/or referendum are cancelled, **Smoky Lake County** will be required to return the initial grant payment to the Government of Alberta, if requested by the province.

Some municipalities may be administering the Senate election and referendum on behalf of the Minister of Municipal Affairs for a neighbouring entity, and will receive the payments calculated for the neighbouring entity. These municipalities will receive a separate letter confirming the additional amounts once the contracts are finalized.

Conducting the Senate election and the referendum at the same time as local elections will leverage efficiencies and economies of scale, while ensuring all Albertans have the ability to participate in the vote.



Dear Smoky Lake Council:

We are writing this letter as lake front property owners at 76 62103 Range Road 133 A (Lot 5) to address issues in the subdivision of Hillside Acres at Whitefish Lake. These issues include but are not limited to the Environmental Reserve (ER). While the ER usage remains the main focus of this letter, a detailed account of all issues experienced are outlined within to share the extreme difficulties encountered since purchase. Our goal is to provide awareness to the situation and we are asking Council to task themselves with addressing these issues and finding solutions.

Our property is adjacent to the Environmental Reserve (Lot 6) and we remain the original property owners purchased 2002. At the time of development we purchased our property with the knowledge that the ER would allow public access via pedestrian traffic only. It has transformed from a grassy green space foot path on inception to a graveled high traffic area used incessantly by off road vehicles, motor vehicles, pedestrians and unleashed pets. It is used as a boat launch, water toy launch, boat lift and dock launch, ATV trail, with vehicles often driving into the water to perform these activities. We acknowledge the *Municipal Government Act* s.664(1.1) outlines the ER purpose is to preserve natural features, prevent pollution of land, ensure safe use of land/and or maintain access to a body of water. The way the ER is used today does ensure there is access to the lake but it is done so at the exorbitant expense of destroying the natural features, creating pollution, and facilitating unsafe use of the land. This ER also does not keep the lake and shoreline preserved or intact. We are requesting Council review the use of the Environmental Reserve at Whitefish Lake and address the numerous concerns about the current state detailed below:

1. Environmental Concerns

The ER given to the County at Hillside Acres development has been changed to a roadway and facilitates vehicles driving on it. It was never intended to serve as a launch area which it has now de facto become. There is limited vegetation or trees on the ER to catch the contaminants that come off of the vehicles to prevent them from entering the lake and the adjacent properties. This bringing of contaminants into the lake, negatively impacts the water quality for the ecosystems and the water guality for the recreational users that swim there. Contamination comes passively from the vehicle use on the ER and actively when the vehicles intentionally enter the water. There is soil erosion from the extent of use. Significant ruts have been created by the traffic. When a structure size is bigger than the reserve, such as a boat lift, it hits the trees bordering the path and causes damage as it is moved from the water through the ER to the road then finally to the Owner's lot. Restoring to the original development and allowing only foot traffic would abate the significant environmental degradation that is occurring from the heavy use. It was never designed or intended to be used in this manner.

Our dock and boat lift system were bought because of the ability to push them into the water with the least environmental impact. We manually push in and pull out the dock and lift each season without the use of any vehicle. We have launched our boat at recognized boat launches such as the one at Paradise Cove and/or Kikino. This information is shared to simply exemplify one can pursue these activities responsibly with environmental stewardship. While we appreciate the desire of other lot owners to pursue recreational activities we believe that this can be accomplished with a lower environmental footprint. We argue that the Environmental Reserve is not the means to achieve this end. Moreover it is not sustainable to service the entire subdivision to access the beach, put in docks, lifts, water crafts, boats, and courier items to the beach from this Environmental Reserve. When we have to bring items to the beach we have to walk to do so and we argue that vehicle access is not required for other recreational users to do this either. Strategic Planning is required to solution the population density this ER is trying to service although it is not equipped to do so.

The noise pollution that results as vehicles drive the Reserve continuously throughout the day is atrocious and would likely not meet the acceptable standards for appropriate decibel levels. Garbage that is littered throughout the reserve can also spill onto the beach. Belongings are left on the reserve and beach areas. Animal waste, human waste, diapers, and garbage have been left in this area.

2. Safety Concerns

The ER is serving as a road which contains ATVs, Motor Vehicles, dirt bikes, pets, and pedestrians. ATV rules are a separate issue governed by *The Traffic Safety Act,* but it becomes explicitly an ER issue with the risk to public safety that is created. There are many ATV users including under age kids driving without helmets or proper supervision, in addition to those that decide to use a car or truck to drive down to the lake, as well as pedestrians. The ER is narrow and requires backing up down the length of the reserve. Typically people don't even drive down a road that length in reverse. Combining mixed use, the heaviness of use and the variety of use it is an accident waiting to happen. How is the integrity of the ER secured to ensure the infrastructure supports this type of traffic? How could it be up to standards when it isn't designated as a road in the first place? Who changed the landscape from the grassy area to the crushed gravel? Where is it documented how/why this reserve has changed over time? Who maintains it? Pedestrians have been asked to move out of the way for ATVs wanting to drive by. Even parking the vehicles becomes an issue as there is insufficient room for everyone to bring their vehicles down there. All this leads to significant public safety risk for all users particularly pedestrians. This is an impediment to accessing the lake safely which contradicts an ER's intention to allow safe access to the beach. The beach area is for public use and often people swim at the base of the reserve. How can swimmers safety be protected

when there are motorized vehicles driving onto the ER and into the water onto the beach where people should be able to enjoy themselves safely.

3. Damage to Private Property

Our Property is directly adjacent to the reserve and our grade is lower than the reserve. There is no buffer between the ER and our property. The traffic can contribute to instability and erosion on our Private Property. Additionally this has led to our trees becoming destabilized which then becomes a hazard that we become responsible to remove. Contaminants can run down the slope into our property.

4. Common Law Nuisance

Our Property was purchased beside an ER not a road. Even roadways have an easement between the private property and the road to protect the property from the road usage and the noise levels. We do not have that protection in this situation nor is there the ability to have a sound barrier. It is used by back lot owners and front lot owners to launch their water vehicles, docks, boat lifts as well as to get general access to the lake. There are 52 back lots and 31 front lots in the area. That is a lot of properties using the ER to get beach access and results in nonstop traffic all day long. People take a joy ride up and down without stopping just to have a place to drive down and yet it is not an ATV trail. Those who do drive down to access the beach do so multiple times within the day to bring numerous people and things to the waterfront. Some use it to drive down their dogs to walk unleashed on the beach. The dogs often wander on our Property and we are left to address it and pick up excrement left behind. Noise pollution and hazards are created that prevents us from enjoying the use of our private property. We paid a premium for this property and pay higher taxes to be beachfront. However, the property is significantly devalued because of all the aforementioned problems. We are entitled to the quiet enjoyment of our lot and the way the Environmental Reserve is allowed to be used today contravenes this right. We acknowledge the rights of every Owner to access the lake in the Subdivision. However, we also have rights that are often infringed upon by the desires and wishes of others. Besides the issues on the reserve we have in previous years been unable to put in a boat lift and dock due to other lot owners blocking our access. Our experience has been our rights have been sacrificed to service the needs/wishes of other lot owners.

We have tried over many years to appropriately address these issues. Solutions attempted include:

- calling Bylaw and Conservation officers with witnessed infractions several times
- talking directly to other lake users to address concerns such as incessant joy riding, boat launching, at large dogs that invade our personal space and private property
- completing Call for Public Input Adoption of Environmental Reserve Bylaw
- Participating in providing Public Input for the Area Structure Plan for Whitefish Lake Bylaw 1189-09

This has culminated in no lasting resolution. Rather it has merely escalated our frustration where we can no longer deal with the stress going to the lake property because it is too much, so we do not go. Our children attend the property regularly and have and are continuing to experience the same issues that we have, so the vicious cycle and problems persist. The lake culture feels one of lawlessness where anything goes and the desire to do what one wants freely supersedes respect for one's neighbor and respect for the precious resource of the lake.

We are asking council to review the use of the Environmental Reserve and recommend the following action:

- Restore the ER back to the original intent of beach access in the form of foot traffic only.
- Clarify the County responsibility and address enforcement issues. Proper use is only maintained by enforcement. How will the county enforce proper use and manage violations? To date when

we have called Municipal and Provincial Officers to address offenses we have been told it's a Provincial issue by the Municipal Government and that is a Municipal Issue by the Provincial Government. We have also been advised at the time of calling that there is a lack of resources available to address and enforce the violation when the violation is actually occurring. We were told to take pictures or videos to document for enforcement. This has led to antagonistic interactions with other lake users and persistent conflict. We have suffered physical and verbal threats when trying to take the action we have been advised to do from the County and Provincial employees. We are constantly put in a conflicting position when trying to address or deal with the violations ourselves even to stand up for safety and we should not be put in this position of enforcer; it is not our role. Subsequent calls to the County led to no enforcement. Clear direction is required from both the Municipal and Provincial Government on who has jurisdiction, and when. Additionally both levels of Government need to respond and address the infractions in a timely manner. There is no use to have governing documents if there is no ability to enforce them.

• The County can circumvent the need to enforce the ER use as intended and lessen the resources required with the solution of abating the ability to use it as a road/boat launch at all. Again this would minimize the need to enforce infractions because they would be prevented from happening in the first place. *The Whitefish Lake Area Structure Plan Bylaw 1189-09 Section 2.5.(7)* outlines recreation activities such as ATVing and snowmobiling in the shoreland will not be allowed. Yet it is allowed to occur with lack of enforcement or penalty of doing so. Closing off the reserve would prevent access to use an ATV on the shoreland which we have documented pictures as proof that it is an ongoing problem. Barriers can be erected that allow only foot traffic to go through and scooter or wheelchair width for those

with accessibility concerns. This width would also allow a stretcher should EMS need to bring one down to the beach.

- We invite Council Representatives to meet with us at the ER so we can showcase the area issues and invite any member to view for oneself on a weekend to see first-hand the problems that have been outlined.
- This ER does not have the infrastructure to support all the lots within the development and alternate solutions must be considered. As those owners who originally bought at development may have sold, we ask that notice be given to each current owner with an infographic on what the ER is able to be used for as we recognize that some may not even know it is an Environmental Reserve and NOT a road or launch area. The ER does not have the capacity to maintain the use from all the vehicles, supplies and people that are currently using it.
- We need to maintain the integrity of Whitefish Lake and place a higher value on environmental preservation. The balance between using the Lake currently favors convenience over protection and sustainability. If we do not protect the lake now, we may not have a quality lake to enjoy in the future.
